Important Information for Exhibitors

1. All species pre-tagging will be the responsibility of the exhibitors and leaders/advisors. Contact the Santa Clara County Fair Office with any questions. The pre-tagging process will be online and are to be completed by leaders/advisors. You will fill out a request form and all material will be mailed, when completed please mail back to the Fair office or drop off at our front office. When you mail back please include payments of \$5 per tag.
2. The Santa Clara County Fair will not be providing shavings. It will be the responsibility of the exhibitor to have enough shavings for the duration of fair. There will be no extra tack space allotted so please plan accordingly.
3. In order to be able to load out on Sunday, ALL exhibitors will have to strip their pens and/or cages clean of shavings and have their area inspected and marked off by a designated Santa Clara County Fair representative.
4. RV spaces are available for exhibitors and their families who wish to stay on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds from Sunday, July 28, 2019 to Sunday, August 4th, 2019. If you would like an RV space during Santa Clara County Fair, please check online or contact the Santa Clara County Fair Office. First submitted forms will have priority as we have limited RV spots this year. One (1) vehicle parking pass is included with the price of the RV pass, but exhibitors and other guests staying on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds in the RV area are still required to purchase admission to the Santa Clara County Fair and parking passes for any additional vehicles. All RV requests and payments will be available with entry forms. Must be completed by July 24th 2019. Please note only one (1) vehicle per RV can be parked in the RV area. If you have a balance due for RV spots from past years you must pay the balance prior to staying at the fair. Fair staff has the right to deny any applications, your money will be refunded if your application is denied. **NEW!**
5. There will not be an Independent or Grange champion awarded in any market class, unless there are a minimum of five (5) animals in the class being owned by a minimum of three (3) different exhibitors. Independent or Grange Exhibitors will not be able to sell more than one (1) animal through Auction if there were not more than ten (10) animals in the species respective market class.
6. All pen decorations and modifications are subject to removal by Santa Clara County Fair Management and Santa Clara County Livestock Staff.
7. An animal may be removed from the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds and disqualified from show if the animal cannot be controlled by the exhibitor or presents danger to any person at the discretion of Santa Clara County Fair Staff Management. This rule applies to Santa Clara County Fair pre-tagging, shows, and any other fair activities.
8. YQCA, Youth for the Quality Care of Animals, for our ethics requirement , is an annual course that is taken online (the course is about an hour long) and can be completed at any time before entering for the 2019 Santa Clara County Fair. All exhibitors will be required to complete Quality Assurance and Ethics Training and have proof of its completion to be eligible to participate. When you have passed the course you will receive a certificate of completion with a certificate number, which you will need to provide in order to complete your online fair entries. **NEW!**
9. There will be a beef and sheep carcass contest that eligible beef and sheep exhibitors will be participating in. All beef and sheep going through auction will be automatically entered in the contest, not pre-entry required. All beef and sheep exhibitors are encouraged to participate in the carcass dinner that is put on by the Santa Clara County Cattlewomen. They request a small donation for the dinner.
10. The Santa Clara County Fair is open to residents of Santa Clara County and Santa Cruz County, unless otherwise noted, over the age of 5, as of January 1, 2019, who are currently in good standing with the Santa Clara County Fair and their club/chapter. The 2019 Santa Clara County Fair is also open to Horse exhibitors of San Benito County.

RULES AND GUIDELINES

Code of Conduct for All Exhibitors

This Code of Ethics was developed IN COOPERATION WITH THE CALIFORNIA STATE 4-H, CALIFORNIA FFA ASSOCIATION, THE CALIFORNIA STATE GRANGE, WESTERN FAIRS ASSOCIATION, AS WELL AS OTHER AGRICULTURAL ORGANIZATIONS. We believe this code, when instituted, will help ensure that all exhibitors are on a level playing field, that animals are treated safely and humanely, that food safety is insured, and that a positive environment is maintained. This Code of Ethics applies to anyone exhibiting animals at the Santa Clara County Fair. It includes Junior, as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. All classes of livestock offered at the livestock event are included: Cattle (Beef & Dairy), Goats (Dairy, Market & Pygmy), Horses, Sheep, Swine, Rabbits, Cavies, Dogs, Pigeons and Poultry. This "Santa Clara County Fair Code of Ethics" will be enhanced with additional rules and regulations, as new standards become necessary.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors.

The following practices or procedures are unacceptable and are defined as being deceptive, fraudulent, unethical, and inhumane in the care, fitting, preparation and showing of all classes of livestock. The use of any illegal drug is prohibited. Legal or illegal substances used to phenotypically alter the appearance of an animal entered in livestock events is prohibited. Use of illegal drugs is considered a premeditated act.

The following is a list of guidelines all exhibitors must follow to enter livestock at organized competitive events.

1. All exhibitors must have viable proof (Junior Division) of ownership available to Fair and Livestock Officials at their request. Market animals (Beef, Sheep, Meat Goats, Swine, Dairy Cattle) must be owned and under exhibitor's daily care according to established rules and regulations for the Santa Clara County Fair
2. The official ownership date is the date shown on the bill of sale, unless the animal was bred by the exhibitor, in which case calving or birth records must be shown. See fair book for ownership requirements for non-market animals. Registered breeding livestock must show the exhibitor as the owner of the animal on the breed association papers or certificate.
3. No exhibitor will be allowed to show an animal which has been previously sold at an auction or sale as a market animal through another fair or livestock show, whether or not there is an actual change of ownership (progress level shows excluded). Any method used to misrepresent the age of an animal for a class in which it is shown is deceptive and considered illegal. Showing an animal for another individual by claiming ownership in order to show in a specific livestock class or event is prohibited. False ownership is illegal.
4. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
5. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. By entering an animal in a livestock show the owner exhibitor, leader, advisor and/or person responsible voluntarily consents for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood,(cont.)

or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Random samples may be collected whether or not the owner of the show animal is present. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory, to which it is sent, is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, leader, advisor or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

6. Livestock shall not be exhibited if drugs administered in accordance with federal, state, local statutes, regulations and rules affect the animals' performance or appearance at the event

7. Any surgical procedure, injections or insertion of foreign material, substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counter-irritant or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation or appearance of an animal's body is illegal. This includes vegetable oil, silicone, air or any other substance used to alter the shape of the animal. Acceptable practices of physical preparation, which are allowed, include clipping of hair, trimming of hooves, and dehorning.

8. The balancing of the udder by abnormal means which includes the use of a mechanical contrivance or the injection of fluid or drugs, setting the teats and/or occluding (sealing the ends) with a mechanical contrivance or use of a chemical preparation is illegal. Treating or massaging the udder or its' attachment with an irritant or counter irritant is prohibited.

9. The use of inhumane showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivances or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited. Other practices, unless under the written authority of a licensed veterinarian, that are not acceptable or prohibited include, but are not limited to, liquid diets for lambs, excessive shrinking, excessive exercising, tying animals with the feet off the ground, and electric stimulation.

10. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, breed classifiers, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

11. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, groomer, trainer, leader, advisor or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this Code of Ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this Code of Ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individuals to disciplinary action of Fair Management and considered final.

12. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, leader, advisor, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

13. Show management reserves the right to require animal health certificates from a licensed veterinarian. (cont.)

Code of Conduct for All Exhibitors

Health inspections and diagnostic tests may be made before or after animals are on the livestock show premises for exhibitor and animal safety, or to inaugurate disease control procedures which may become necessary in emergencies as determined by animal health officials.

14. Any violation of the "Santa Clara County Fair Code of Ethics", State Rules, Santa Clara County Fair Rules or Residue Avoidance Program, or specific rules as designated by the Santa Clara County Fair will result in forfeiture of premiums, awards, disqualification, and will result in probationary status and/or loss of eligibility for future participation in organized livestock competition. Possible civil penalties may be imposed by the proper authorities based on evidence provided by the livestock show of exhibitors in violation of the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act or the animal mistreatment, neglect, and abandonment laws that apply on the local, state and national levels. Other cooperating shows will be notified of the action taken by the show management, which may affect the eligibility of the individual, group, or sponsoring organization for participation at other shows.

15. Obscene language, running and roughhousing will not be tolerated at any time.

16. NO smoking will be permitted at any time at any place on the premises. Tobacco products will not be permitted at any time on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds. Please note this includes non-tobacco smoking and electronic cigarettes as well.

17. Drinking of alcoholic beverages by minors as defined by County Ordinance or State Law will not be allowed at any time and/or on any part of the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds.

18. The use of any illegal substances will not be tolerated on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds.

19. The use or possession of firecrackers will be grounds for immediate suspension from the Santa Clara County Fair.

20. Exhibitors will be held responsible for damage to any facilities or equipment.

21. Lariats, riding crops, etc. that are used to control animals will be used safely and appropriately. No bull rings.

22. Any person acting in an abusive manner toward people or animals will be immediately removed from the Santa Clara County Fair.

23. Youth exhibitors must be chaperoned at all times by an adult over the age of 21.

24. Youth exhibitors that stay overnight at the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds in the RV Area must be chaperoned by an adult 25 years of age or older.

25. Exhibitors shall conduct themselves in a professional manner in the barns. Including but not limited to appropriate dress, physical contact and offensive language.

26. Exhibitors are not permitted to sell anything except auction and fur and feather sale entries. This includes all fundraising activities (food, drinks, newspaper/periodical subscriptions, etc.).

Exhibitors can request permission from Santa Clara County Fair Management for exceptions to this rule; please note that a vendor fee may be required.

Animals and other exhibits requiring care:

27. Exhibitors are responsible for their animals and any other exhibit requiring care (such as a garden installation.) Santa Clara County Fair Management is not responsible for providing food, water or supervision.

28. Exhibitors will keep animal areas clean at all times and abide by all fire code areas.

29. Exhibitors who are reported to the management for abuse or neglect of their animals will be brought before management for appropriate action.

30. Exhibitors will not be allowed in the "barns" from 9:30 P.M. to 6:00 A.M. unless authorized by Santa Clara County Fair staff. If a show is still in progress after 9:30 P.M., the barns will close one (1) hour after the completion of that show.

The undersigned Exhibitor and his/her Parent or Legal Guardian, County Extension Agent (CEA) or 4-H or FFA Leader hereby certify that each has read, understands and will abide by the current Santa Clara County Fair Book and all rules and regulations of the Santa Clara County Fair Livestock. We further certify that we have not administered and, to the best of our knowledge, any entry from this exhibitor has not received any substance not approved by the FDA and/or USDA. In instances where an animal has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for its species, the exhibitor must be aware that the time it takes for no drug residue to be found in the system is generally longer than the labeled withdrawal time for most drugs. Santa Clara County Fair maintains a ZERO TOLERANCE POLICY for unethically fitted livestock. Adequate time must have passed so that the animal does not test positive for drugs upon arrival. Once the animals arrive on the fairgrounds, they must remain free and clear of all drug and chemical residues.

Veterinarians / Medication: Animals under the care of a licensed veterinarian and/or taking any type of performance enhancing medication to include, but not limited to steroids, diuretics, anti-inflammatories, tranquilizers and painkillers, are ineligible for competition. Exhibitors with questions regarding medications and/or eligibility should consult with the Veterinarian prior to competition. Santa Clara County Fair Management arranges to have veterinarians; however, they do NOT donate their services or medications. Fees should be discussed before treatment. All medication administered during the livestock show must be administered by the Veterinarian and a written medication record must be filed. Animals receiving performance enhancing drugs (e.g., steroids, diuretics, anti-inflammatories, tranquilizers and painkillers, etc.) in this manner are ineligible for competition.

The Exhibitor agrees to submit any animal, breeding and/or market, entered by him/her to inspection by any veterinarian or testing agency appointed by the Management of Santa Clara County Fair and agrees to have such animal submitted to such tests as may be requested at any time. Santa Clara County Fair also reserves the right to have ultrasound, D.N.A., Blood, tissue and /or urine laboratory analysis made on any animal entered for competition. The conclusions reached by the veterinarian and/or testing agency and analyses shall be final and conclusive without recourse against the Santa Clara County Fair or any officer, director, employee, independent contractor or agent thereof, including, without limitation, any veterinarian or testing agency appointed by the Management (collectively referred to as the Released Parties). The Exhibitor waives assertion of any action as a result of decisions rendered as a result of this rule and further releases the Released Parties from any and all claims or demands whatsoever in connection with the inspection or testing of any such animal or any ruling or action taken by reason of the conclusions of such veterinarian or testing agency.

As breeding animals are not entering the food chain, the USDA Wholesome Meat Act does not apply; however, breeding animals will be closely screened for any performance enhancing compounds. This includes, but is not limited to, steroids, diuretics, anti-inflammatories, tranquilizers and painkillers. In the event any animal is declared by the veterinarian or testing agency to be unethically fitted, the Fair Management will disqualify the exhibitor from this year's competition and one year following the incident. Reinstatement of anyone disqualified may be made only by the Fair Management. The Exhibitor will forfeit all titles, awards, prizes, auction proceeds, premiums, scholarships and market/floor money if the animal is disqualified.

In the event where an animal sample does not match after the DNA analysis test, the animal and exhibitor in question shall be disqualified. The exhibitor shall be blocked from the auction. All awards and premiums shall be forfeited. The exhibitor will be banned from entering the 2020 Santa Clara County Fair. There shall be no appeal process.

The Fair Management decision is FINAL. Fair Management reserves the right to extend the disqualification to family members and leaders/advisors.

Rules and Guidelines

NOTE: All state rules for California Fairs will be strictly adhered to. Please read these rules carefully before entering. State Fair rules for California Fairs can be found in the Santa Clara County Fair office or on the Santa Clara County Fair website – www.thefair.org. Santa Clara County Fair rules and guidelines may differ from State Rules for California Fairs and be more restrictive. This is allowable.

SANTA CLARA COUNTY FAIR MANAGEMENT IS NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR FINDING ERRORS ON EXHIBITOR'S ENTRIES. Errors in entries may be DISQUALIFIED at management's discretion.

The Santa Clara County Fair Management reserves the final and absolute right to interpret all rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions, and differences in regard thereto, and also reserves the right to amend and add to these rules.

Interpretation of Rules:

1. The Management of the Santa Clara County Fair (includes Executive Director, Fair Manager, Agricultural Programming Coordinator, Livestock Supervisor and any others deemed by the executive director) reserves the right to amend, add to and interpret the following Rules and Regulations; and to arbitrarily settle and determine all questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, connected with or incident to the Santa Clara County Fair. All Rules contained in the "State Rules for California Fairs" as prescribed by the Division of Fairs & Expositions apply to this Fair.

Entering and Fee Payments:

2. All areas of competition require an entry form. Santa Clara County Fair entries can be found online ONLY. If exhibitors require help they can call the Santa Clara County Fair Office with any questions they have.
3. Check department rules and guidelines for entry guidelines and fees. Important dates are on the animal show schedule
4. All fee payments will be online at checkout during the entry process. We accept Visa, MasterCard & Discover for fee payments. Late entries and Fees will require an additional late fee of \$10.00 per class at check out.
5. All exhibitors and parents must purchase admission and parking passes for the days the Santa Clara County Fair is open to the public. These passes are available online at discounted rates if purchased with entries.
6. All signatures and information necessary to determine that the exhibit and exhibitor are eligible must be on the online entry form.
7. Exhibitor's signature on the entry form signifies their acceptance of the rules and regulations governing the Santa Clara County Fair and exhibitor Code of Conduct as printed in the Official Entry Book.
8. All exhibitors are required to submit a signed exhibitor Code of Conduct form with entries. Failure to do so will lead to disqualification. NO EXCEPTIONS!
9. All community club leaders and advisors will need to approve fair entries and will be emailed a list of their club/chapter entries for them to approve.

YQCA Yearly Online Ethics Course

10. YQCA, Youth for the Quality Care of Animals, will continue to be required for our ethics requirement in order to stay compliant with the rules for California Fairs. This is an annual course that is taken online (the course is about an hour long) and must be completed before entering for the 2019 Santa Clara County Fair. When you have passed the course you will receive a certificate of completion, the certificate will have a number on it which will be required when you complete your fair entries. If the number, you enter is found to be fraudulent and you have no proof of completion your entries will be denied and you will not be allowed to exhibit at the 2019 Santa Clara County Fair.

Rules and Guidelines

13. **To register:** go to <https://yqca.learnrow.io/Account/Login> and make an account. You will need to make a separate account for each exhibitor (siblings cannot take the course together; they each need an individual certificate to enter at the fair). The course is \$12 per exhibitor. Clubs/projects have the opportunity to fundraise to cover the costs, as YQCA does offer coupon codes that are one time use codes that cover the registration costs. You can find more information about the coupon codes here: <http://yqca.org/buy-coupons/>
14. **More about YQCA:** Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) is a national multi-species quality assurance program for youth ages 8 to 21. The program is designed to provide an estimated 60 minutes of education each year. The online program requires the passing of a series of three quizzes to earn certification. YQCA is the result of a collaborative effort between states that have previously offered multi-species youth livestock quality assurance programs, the National Pork Board's Youth PQA Plus program and representatives from other national livestock groups. YQCA is designed as an annual education and certification program focused on food safety, animal well-being and character awareness for youth ages 8 to 21 producing and/or showing pigs, beef cattle, dairy cattle, sheep, goats, market rabbits, and poultry. The program has been designed by extension specialists and national livestock program managers to ensure it is accurate, current and relevant to the needs of the animal industry and shows and is appropriate for youth.
15. **More about the Online Course:** The online program includes three components for each topic (food safety, animal well-being, and character development): 1) knowledge builder, 2) skills lab and 3) quiz for each content topic, and are designed specifically for each age group. To fulfill their year of training, youth will complete three of these online modules. The knowledge builder allows students to learn new information in an engaging, age-appropriate and interactive format. Students can read content, watch videos, analyze pictures, and practice skills while progressing through a series of interactive content components. Skills labs offer realistic situational opportunities for youth to apply the new knowledge gained in the knowledge builder. These labs take students through a comprehensive journey of the content, requiring them to apply skills and make decisions resembling those they will face in real life. The quiz is the final piece of the online learning experience, testing student's overall knowledge of the content. Students can receive immediate feedback or see their results at the conclusion of the quiz. A pass rate of 80% has been established with students being able to repeat the module if needed.
16. **Who has to take it:** All youth exhibitors ages 9-19 must take the online course, and upload their certificate of completion when entering online. Since YQCA has not yet developed a parent/leader course, we will not be requiring leaders to take it this year. That will change once they develop a course specifically for leaders.
17. If the exhibitor is under 8 years old, please contact the fair office for instructions on completing your entries.

Rules and Guidelines

2019 Judging and Awards:

18. Checks for premiums will be made payable to the exhibitor as indicated on the online entry form. Checks will become void after six (6) months of the distribution and will not be reissued (no exceptions).
19. No checks will be issued over the amount of \$500 without a social security number on record for the exhibitor.
19. Only the official judges' books will be used as evidence for payment of premiums. Ribbons and tags will not be accepted as proof.
20. Santa Clara County Fair Management may combine or eliminate class of four (4) or less entries for meaningful competition.
21. The Santa Clara County Fair does not guarantee the payment of "special" premiums and awards offered in this book by merchants or breeder's associations. These prizes are usually secured by Santa Clara County Fair Management with a promissory statement in good faith and must be contested under these conditions.

Exhibitor ticket prices: **NEW!**

22. All exhibitors will be required to purchase tickets and parking for all four (4) days that the Santa Clara County Fair is open to the public. Tickets will be available with entries at a discounted rate. Final day to purchase Admission Tickets and Parking Passes at a discounted rate is when online entries are due July 2, 2019.

Attire Standards:

23. Full uniforms must be worn in the show rings and auction arena!
24. All exhibitors are to abide by the uniform requirements of their respective organizations while showing their animals.
 - a. **FFA** - The official FFA show uniform will be:
 - i. Boys - White pants ONLY, white shirt, FFA tie, Official FFA jacket zipped to the top.
 - ii. Girls - White pants ONLY, white blouse, FFA scarf, Official FFA jacket zipped to the top.
 - b. **4-H** - The official 4-H show uniform will be:
 - i. 4-H cap worn on the head.
 - ii. White shirt with long or short sleeves and 4-H tie or scarf, with 4-H emblem.
 1. It is required that Poultry, Cavy and Rabbit exhibitors wear long sleeve white shirts when carrying and showing their animals.
 - iii. White pants ONLY!
 - iv. Closed toe shoes or boots.
 - v. Girls may substitute a white blouse and skirt or white dress with 4-H collar for items ii and iii. No tank tops or halters allowed.
 - vi. Primary members can wear 4-H cap and 4-H tie or scarf.
 - c. **Grange** - The Official Grange show uniform will be:
 - i. Dark blue denim pants, white button-front dress shirt with collar; the official red vest with National Grange emblem on the back (this must be purchased through the California State Grange office, no homemade vests will be allowed); black or brown belt with appropriate buckle; and closed toe shoes or boots.
 - ii. Hats and headgear of any kind are not to be worn while showing.
 - d. **Independent** - The Official Independent show uniform will be:
 - i. White pants ONLY, white shirt or blouse, black tie (no string ties or scarves allowed) EXCLUDING any insignia.
 - ii. Closed toe shoes or boots

Rules and Guidelines

Exhibitor Age Requirements:

25. Small Animals
 - a. Pygmy Goats – Juniors per state rules for California Fairs rules, minimum age of 5, as of January 1st of the current year.
 - b. Rabbits & Cavies - All Juniors per ARBA rules, minimum age of 5, as of January 1st of the current year.
 - c. Poultry and Eggs– All Juniors, minimum age of 5, as of January 1st of the current year.
 - d. Dogs – All juniors, minimum age of 5, as of January 1st of the current year
26. Junior Livestock
 - e. Market Animals – Beef, sheep, market goats, and rabbit meat pens- Juniors, age 9 or older, as of January 1st of the current year, from Santa Clara, and Santa Cruz, counties per state rules for California Fairs. Please see department rules for specifics.
 - f. Breeding Beef, Sheep, Swine, Dairy Cattle & Dairy Goats – Juniors, age 9 or older, as of January 1st of the current year, from Santa Clara and, Santa Cruz, counties per state rules for California Fairs.
 - g. Horses – Juniors, age 9 or older, as of January 1st of the current year from Santa Clara, San Benito and Santa Cruz Counties. Please see department rules for specifics.
27. Adult Livestock-
 - a. Open to exhibitors that have aged out of youth organizations. Over the age of 19. If within the age specification to be eligible for either 4-H or FFA then you are not eligible to participate in our adult livestock/super steer competition.
28. Mini Horse-
 - a. Open to all juniors and adults
27. 4-H, FFA and Grange exhibitors will follow their organization's membership rules.
28. Independents must be 9 year old by January 1st of current year to participate in the Santa Clara County Fair. Exhibitors are eligible to compete/exhibit through December 31 of the year in which the turn 19 years of age.
29. Youth may be ineligible to participate as an independent if documented disciplinary action involving their projectors has been taken against them by 4-H, FFA or Grange Organizations. Length of ineligibility to be determined by Santa Clara County Fair Management.

Safety:

30. Any person not complying with the rules and guidelines and/or instructions may be removed from the Santa Clara County Fair.
31. No running will be tolerated at any times in the barn(s).
32. No dogs are allowed on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds except for service dogs and show participants, which must be kept on a leash. Dogs staying in the RV area MUST be confined to that area.
33. NO DOGS ARE ALLOWED IN ANY ANIMAL AREAS.
34. Santa Clara County Fair Management Corporation, the County of Santa Clara or their agents will use every precaution for the safe preservation of all articles and stock on exhibition, but will not be accountable for any loss or damage, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage.
35. No bikes, skateboards, scooters or hover boards etc. (powered or otherwise) are allowed on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds. This rule does not apply to wheelchairs or other mobility assistance devices.
36. The Santa Clara County Fairgrounds is a smoke-free environment. Persons who smoke may be asked to stop and if refuse to do so or are seen smoking again while on county property will be restricted from being on grounds for the duration of the Santa Clara County Fair. Please note this includes non-tobacco smoking and electronic cigarettes as well.

Rules and Guidelines

- 37. NO ANIMALS ALLOWED OUTSIDE OF LIVESTOCK AREAS!
- 38. NO LARGE ANIMALS ALLOWED IN THE RV PARK AT ANY TIME.
- 39. All species to stay in their designated area.

General Responsibilities and Expectations:

- 40. As a Junior, FFA, 4-H, Grange, Independent or adult exhibitor, compliance with the following rules, and all State rules for California Fairs and Local rules, is a condition for exhibiting at the Santa Clara County Fair. By submitting your online entries you signify your compliance with all Santa Clara County Fair rules.
- 41. Non-market and market classes in Junior livestock are open to all youth (except for clovers and independents), as defined in the State rules for California Fairs, from the following counties: Santa Clara and Santa Cruz. The 2019 Santa Clara County Fair is also open to San Benito Horse Exhibitors ONLY.
- 42. Showmanship is an individual entry. Exhibitors must pre-register for showmanship separately on the online entry form. Entries will NOT be accepted once animals have arrived on grounds!
- 43. All exhibitors can attend the pre-fair meeting on Wednesday, July, 17th, 2019 at 6:30PM located in Expo Hall. Passes will be available at this meeting, but are also available on check in day, July 28, 2019. This meeting is no longer mandatory but anyone is welcome to come and get an update prior to fair. A meeting will be held Sunday evening after weigh in as well.
- 44. All animals entered, including market animals going through auction, MUST BE KEPT AT THE SANTA CLARA COUNTY FAIRGROUNDS. All animals left at the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds are the responsibility of the exhibitor. Santa Clara County Fair staff members are not responsible for supervising the animals.
- 45. It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor to correct all discrepancies in connection with the entries or exhibits which are required of them by the rules printed in this book. Awards may not be made for exhibits in which discrepancies have not been corrected before judging of the class has started.
- 46. The exhibitor is responsible for correctly entering their animal and all required information. Santa Clara County FAIR MANAGEMENT AND/OR DEPARTMENT CHAIRS ARE NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR FINDING ERRORS ON EXHIBITOR'S ENTRIES.
- 47. No signs or business cards may be placed on any exhibit, except club signs and stall cards on livestock pens, without permission from Santa Clara County Fair Management.
- 48. The Santa Clara County Fair ends at 10:00PM on Sunday. Animals must stay through the end of Santa Clara County Fair. Animals may be released at 8:00PM on Sunday, but an approved release form must be presented in order to remove an animal from the premises. Please see animal release section for more rules.
- 49. Exhibitors are responsible for cleaning the pens used by their animal(s) daily by 9:00AM. In addition, exhibitors are solely responsible for the care and feeding of their animal(s) during Santa Clara County Fair.

Exhibitors not complying with this rule may be denied return to the Santa Clara County Fair and/or receiving any premium or auction monies.

- 50. Animals entered in market classes cannot be entered in any other class except showmanship.
- 51. AUCTION DEADLINE: 6pm or within one hour after the completion of the beef show on Thursday, August 1st, 2019. YOU MUST BRING YOUR COMPLETED AUCTION PAPERWORK TO THE SANTA CLARA COUNTY LIVESTOCK OFFICE BY THE DEADLINE.
- 52. ALL trailers/vehicles coming onto the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds may be inspected. Any trailer/vehicle containing sheep, goats and pigs MUST go through the vet check line before pulling up to the barn.
- 53. The Veterinarian and/or approved Santa Clara County Fair Individual has final say on the health of all animals, including whether or not an animal, and all animals traveling in the same trailer, can be admitted to the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds. The decision of the appointed Veterinarian and/or approved Santa Clara County Fair Individual on the health of your animal is final; no exceptions or appeals.

Rules and Guidelines

54. In accordance with State rules for California Fairs, no animal shall be admitted or remain on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds that shows any evidence of any active, communicable disease, or any other unsightly disease or other condition. No animal shall be admitted to the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds from any other premises under quarantine for disease. Santa Clara County Fair Management reserves the right to require health inspections and/or diagnostic tests before, during and after animals are on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds and to implement disease control procedures as deemed necessary. The health of animals when determined by the official Veterinarian and/or approved Santa Clara County Fair individual or judge will be final and cannot be protested!
55. Exhibitors refusing to have their animals examined shall be disqualified and such violation shall be reported to the State Fairs and Exhibitions Department. No refund will be made.
56. Market and feeder animal exhibitors shall be responsible for having animals weighed at the Santa Clara County Fair. Only one (1) weigh-in allowed. Any question of weight must be resolved while animal is on the scale and only ONE (1) re-weigh is allowed. All market animal classes are to be determined after weigh-in; classes are to be determined by weight only.
57. If an exhibitor is choosing to re-weigh their animal, they must:
- a. Request while on the scale.
 - b. Remove the animals so the scale can be rebalanced.
 - c. Reweigh the animal.
 - d. Regardless if final weight is more or less than the original weight it will be the final weight recorded by the weigh master.
58. All tags other than the official Santa Clara County Fair tags and scrapie tags (i.e. past fair tags, breeder tags, etc) will be removed on the scale.
59. All animals need to be secured and have someone attending to them at all times when NOT in their pen or stall, including but not limited to wash racks, blocking chutes and fitting stands.
60. Market animals may only be entered in the Santa Clara County Fair one time as a market animal.

Conduct:

61. Exhibitors, their immediate family and agents thereof, who do not cooperate with security personnel or other Fair officials in all matters of policy, including but not limited to parking, stall/pen/space assignments and judging, will have their entries canceled and will be ordered to remove their exhibits from the grounds immediately and forfeit all awards, premium monies and sale proceeds. (All parties involved will not be allowed back on the grounds for the remainder of that fair year. Failure to adhere to this rule will result in being banned from the Santa Clara County Fair.)
62. Exhibitors, their immediate family or agents thereof, causing public disturbance, those that are uncooperative and/or unsportsmanlike, those not following good animal welfare practices as determined by management, or those found in violation of rules or in practices inadmissible with the Fair program and/or policies/procedures shall be penalized. Penalties shall include forfeiture of awards, premiums and sale proceeds. (All parties involved will not be allowed back on the grounds for the remainder of that fair year. Failure to adhere to this rule will result in being banned from the Santa Clara County Fair.)

Junior Livestock Responsibilities and Expectations:

63. Exhibitors are limited to the number of large market animals they may exhibit at the Santa Clara County Fair. No exhibitor may exhibit a total of more than four (4) large market animals - steer, market goat, lamb or hog. The exhibitor that is chosen to raise the Heritage Hog will be the ONLY exception to the total of large market animals.

Rules and Guidelines

64. The Clover Foundation will be selecting one (1) exhibitor to raise its Heritage Hog.
- The Heritage Hog will not be taken into account towards the exhibitor's four (4) market animals, nor the one (1) auction animal.
 - The Heritage Hog will be entered as an "heritage hog swine entry" and will not be eligible for Champion or Reserve Champion. It will only be judged for market readiness.
 - The Heritage Hog may be used as exhibitor's showmanship animal.
 - The animal must be owned by the exhibitor a minimum of 60 days or by May 31, 2019.
65. Animals from exhibitors in the Santa Clara County will be given first priority of space in the barn, due to limited facilities. If room still exists for out of county it will be first come first serve based on the exhibitors that entered first.
66. All swine, sheep and goats must pass a vet check upon arrival at the back of the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds before they are allowed to go to their assigned pens.
- All sheep and goats must have an intact and attached scrapie tag to pass the check.
 - Dairy goats and breeding Boer goats are allowed to have a readable ear tattoo (tail tattoo for lamancha) for scrapie in lieu of a tag.
 - No tattooing or blunting on Santa Clara County Fairgrounds property. The ownership papers must reference this registration number.
 - This is a federally mandated requirement; no exceptions will be allowed. The decision of the appointed Veterinarian and/or approved Santa Clara County Fair Individual on the health of your animal is final; no appeal is possible.
67. On receiving day, exhibitors should enter through Gate F off Umbarger Rd., and leave their animals in their trailer until the vet has cleared them, once cleared animals can be taken into their designated areas.

Small Animal Responsibilities and Expectations:

68. On receiving and/or judging day, exhibitors should enter through Gate F off Umbarger Rd., unload in the designated area and proceed to the check-in and judging areas.
69. The Santa Clara County Fair is a "coop-in" show. All exhibitors are required to leave their animals at the Santa Clara County Fair from their show day until Sunday, August 4th, 2019 at 8:00 PM. Pygmy Goats and Dairy Goats are required to go through vet check on Sunday, July 29th and stay the remainder of the week.
70. Exhibitors are responsible for cleaning the cages and pens used by their animal(s). ALL small animal pens and cage trays must be COMPLETELY cleaned out DAILY and the bedding must be replaced with new bedding by 9:00 AM. NO EXCEPTIONS. In addition, exhibitors are solely responsible for the care and feeding of their animal(s) during the Santa Clara County Fair. Exhibitors not complying with this rule may be denied future entry to the Santa Clara County Fair and/or receiving any premium or auction monies.
71. Cage decorations must not prevent airflow to any cage and must be out of reach of animals.
72. Owners are responsible for ensuring that their animals' cages are securely fastened. Animal owners will supervise securing of cages and will provide pliers and hog ring crimpers or cable (zip) ties.
73. Rabbit and cavy exhibitors are responsible for their animals arriving at the judging tables on time.
74. All animals must be identified by appropriate/approved method prior to arrival at the Santa Clara County Fair. The Santa Clara County Fair does not supply leg bands.
- Rabbits – ear tattoo **Note that any duplication of ear markings by exhibitors in the same class must be eliminated per ARBA regulations.**
 - Cavies – ear tattoo or ear tag.
 - Pygmy Goats – tattoo or microchip. Exhibitors are responsible for providing microchip reader at vet check and the show. The Santa Clara County Fair does not supply microchip readers.
75. A judge may excuse any animal from competition if it appears fatigued or out of condition. A judge may excuse a rabbit from competition because of temporary curable disease or parasite.

Rules and Guidelines

76. Exhibitor is responsible for checkout of small market animals, pygmy goats and rabbits. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to arrange processing and delivery of market animals sold through the Santa Clara County Fair Junior Livestock Auction.

Ownership and Bill of Sale:

77. All livestock animals must be owned by the exhibitor by respective ownership dates. The only exceptions are as follows:
- a. Horses entered in English, Gymkhana, Western, and showmanship classes may be leased. This does not include halter classes.
78. Each individual market animal **MUST** have its own individual bill of sale clearly showing ownership by the exhibitor. Exhibitor must be the sole owner of the animal. No co-ownership is allowed.
79. A bill of sale or a lease (ownership papers) must contain the following information:
- a. Name and address of BOTH the buyer/lessee and the seller/lessor.
 - b. Animal identification (description, ear tags, ear notches, tattoos etc.).
 - c. All sheep and goats must have scrapie ID numbers and the animal must have a matching scrapie ear tag intact and attached to ear.
 - d. registered sheep and goats may be identified with a registration tattoo instead of a tag, as long as the animal is accompanied by a copy of the registration certificate listing the current owner or the registration certificate and a completed transfer of ownership form dated within 30 days that lists the current owner
 - e. The ownership papers must reflect the scrapie ID number; if applicable.
 - f. The bill of sale for all cattle privately purchased must be on California State form, commonly known as the "yellow sheet".
 - g. Exhibitors leasing horses must have a lease agreement in place naming the horse, a description of the horse and/or registration information if animal is registered, the name of the owner (lessee) and the name of the person leasing the animal (lessor). Said lease agreement must be signed and notarized at least 120 days prior to the start of The Fair Horse Show. A picture of said horse must be attached. A lease agreement must be in place for all leased horses.
80. A copy of original proof of ownership paperwork (bill of sale, brand inspection certificate, etc.) must be attached with entries for all market animals. Failure to provide proof of ownership will prohibit the animal from being shown at the Santa Clara County Fair – No Exceptions.
81. During Fair- Original ownership paperwork for cattle must be surrendered at weigh-in. All other ownership papers must be available if requested.
82. All Breeding animal exhibitors must check in their ownership papers on receiving day.
83. All market beef must be owned 120 days prior to the first day of the Santa Clara County Fair. Bill of sale must be dated April 3, 2019 or earlier
84. All other large market animals (i.e. market sheep, markets goats and market swine) entered must be owned at least 60 days prior to first day of the Santa Clara County Fair. Bill of sale must be dated May 31, 2019
85. All small market animals (rabbits) must be owned 30 consecutive days prior to receiving day at the Santa Clara County Fair. Bill of sale must be dated July 2, 2019 or earlier.
86. Horses must be leased by March 23, 2019 - 120 consecutive days prior to the receiving day of the Santa Clara County Fair Horse Show. Ownership papers must be dated by March 23, 2019 or earlier – 120 days prior to receiving day of the Fair Show. Lease Agreements and Ownership Statements **MUST** be Notarized. Registration papers issued by Breed Registry need not be Notarized.

Rules and Guidelines

87. Dairy animals must be owned 30 consecutive days prior to the first day of the Santa Clara County Fair. Ownership papers must be dated July 2, 2019 or earlier.

88. The Santa Clara County Fair requires the same 30-day ownership period for all breeding animals. Bill of sale must be dated July 2, 2019 or earlier. Exhibitors must present all necessary papers to the livestock office at check in State Rules for California Fairs regarding breeding partnerships apply.

Pre-Fair Tagging:

89. All market animal pre-tagging will be the responsibility of the exhibitor and leaders/advisors. Contact the Santa Clara County Fair office for tagging materials and procedures. All tagging material will be requested through our website and then will be mailed. The DNA kits can either be mailed back or dropped off at the fairgrounds front office. Beef DNA kits are due by April 3, 2019 and Sheep/goats/swine are due by May 31st, 2019. DNA and all applicable paperwork and tagging fees **MUST BE IN THE FAIR OFFICE BY THE DEADLINE.**

90. DNA sample, in a sealed envelope with the exhibitors signature across the seal, for all market species will be required with the pre-tagging paperwork as well as, a \$5 pre-tagging fee. The envelope should also include the fair tag and other tag information (i.e. scrapie number or swine ear notches).

91. Beef pre-tagging fees have graciously been covered by the Santa Clara County Cattlewomen for Santa Clara County Fair 2019. To celebrate their 70th anniversary.

92. Failure to have your market animal pre-tagged will prohibit your animal from being entered in the 2019 Santa Clara County Fair – **NO EXCEPTIONS WILL BE MADE.**

93. If your Santa Clara County Fair tag or your animal's scrapie tag falls out before fair time, contact the fair office immediately for a new tag and for instructions for a missing scrapie tag or fair tag.

94. New this year there will be a re-tagging fee if your tag falls out of \$5. Every effort should be made to ensure that the tag is put in properly so that it lasts through the fair. **NEW!**

95. All tags will be prepaid for. If you have extra tags they need to be mailed back to the fair office and you will be refunded.

During the Fair:

96. Any animal treated while on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds, whether by the veterinarian, owner, or individual must be reported immediately to the livestock department supervisors. Vet bills for all sick or injured animals are the responsibility of the exhibitor.

97. Any substance given to a market animal while on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds must be reported to the livestock office prior to administering the animal. Substances include but are not limited to herbs, "calming" substances, aspirins, and over the counter medications. This is a reporting requirement and will assist the exhibitor in ensuring that the market animal is given substances that will be acceptable by the processor.

98. During the Santa Clara County Fair all market goats, sheep, swine, and dairy goat stalls and pens must be stripped Thursday August 1st, by 9:00 AM. The old bedding must be put into designated areas. Exhibitors will be responsible for spot cleaning their pens during the rest of the week. Santa Clara County Fair management may ask exhibitors to clean their pens on any day. Cattle bedding may need to be stripped on Wednesday but will be up the discretion of Fair Staff.

99. Exhibitors may be required to strip, adjust or add to the bedding of their pens at any time if deemed necessary by fair staff.

100. The junior exhibitor must do all grooming of their animal(s). No professional or adult help is allowed, other than leaders or advisors, who may hold the animal while the exhibitor works. Santa Clara County Fair Management may approach exhibitors if a violation of this rule is reported. No artificial coloring of animals is allowed except on hooves and horns.

101. All beef cattle and dairy cattle must have a neck rope and a halter on at all times.

102. Exhibitors will be held responsible for damage they cause to any Santa Clara County Fairground's facility or equipment.

Rules and Guidelines

103. All decorative materials and pen modifications are subject to removal by Santa Clara County Fair Livestock Management.
104. Educational material should be done properly and neatly. Any materials that have false information or are not appropriate for the public will be removed by fair staff.
105. No junior exhibitor will be allowed to sleep in a pen with their animals.
106. Animals must be bedded with pine shavings, which will NOT be provided by the Santa Clara County Fair, except for dairy cattle which may be bedded on straw. Straw is the responsibility of the exhibitor.
107. VIOLATION OF ANY RULES MAY RESULT IN DISQUALIFICATION!
108. Chaperones/parents are NOT allowed into the livestock arena after the completion of a class to take pictures with the judge. There will be a 5-minute opportunity for pictures to be taken at the conclusion of the show.

Animal Release:

109. No animal, product, or article on exhibition can be removed from the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds before the announced time. Junior large animals will be released at 8:00 PM on Sunday, August 5th, 2019. It is the exhibitor/parent/advisor's responsibility to make arrangements for livestock to be picked up at release time. All displays must be left intact until release time.
110. Written releases are required for removal of all livestock. Removal of any livestock prior to designated release time, without proper release, or failure to remove animals, will cause forfeiture of all awards, premiums and sale proceeds. Exhibitor will not be able to participate in the Santa Clara County Fair the following year.
111. Written Releases will be issued by appropriate Fair officials after proper cleaning of pens/stalls has been completed.
112. The Santa Clara County Fair shall not be responsible for exhibits remaining on the grounds after the designated release times.

Stall Cards:

113. All animals are required to have a stall card on their pens.
114. The following information MUST be included on your stall card.
 - a. Exhibitors Name
 - b. Club/ Chapter/ Etc.
 - c. Animals Name
 - d. Ear Tag Number

Rules and Guidelines

NEW!

Note to Leader/Advisor: By approving online entries, each leader/supervisor acknowledges that:

116. He/she has read the Santa Clara County Fair Junior Livestock Competition Handbook Rules (General, Livestock, Small Animal and Special) and Regulations;
117. The Junior Exhibitor has owned, fed and cared for the Junior Livestock animal(s) throughout the required ownership period. He/she has supervised the Junior Exhibitor and the Junior Livestock animal(s) have not had any drugs, chemicals, feed additives, or other substances used on them except pursuant to the label specifications, or unless under the direction and supervision of a licensed veterinarian for therapeutic purposes. All drugs, chemicals, feed additives or other substances for which the required withdrawal period has not elapsed prior to arrival at the Fair must be declared on a Declaration of Medication Form at official weigh-in
118. He/she has supervised the Junior Exhibitor and the Junior Livestock animal(s) have not been tampered with in any way, including but not limited to, unethical fitting or any method altering the natural conformation of any part of the animal(s) body;
119. He/she understands the penalties for violating these General, Livestock and Special Rules and Regulations, include but are not limited to, monetary penalties, and the immediate disqualification of the Junior Exhibitor, and/or jeopardizing the chapter or club's entry in the 2019 Santa Clara County Fair and any subsequent fairs.

Junior Livestock Auction Rules

1. Open-bid participation in the Santa Clara County Fair Livestock Auction is open to market animals exhibited, judged and owned by Santa Clara County resident exhibitors who are approved by 4-H and FFA ONLY.
2. Exhibitors may only sell one (1) market animal through the auction, regardless of affiliation or lack of affiliation with an association. For exceptions see below.
 - a. All Champion and Reserve Champion lots must be sold. Exhibitors with animals other than Champion and/or Reserve Champion will be allowed to auction one (1) additional animal or meat pen, for each Champion and/or Reserve Champion, per exhibitor.
 - b. Out of County and Independent exhibitors are subject to all guidelines referencing the sale of their market animals.
 - c. The Heritage Hog will not count toward the exhibitor's limit of one (1) auction entry.
3. Santa Cruz County, Grange and Independent exhibitors may sell one animal through the Santa Clara County Fair if:
 - a. The exhibitor will not participate in the auction. Animals will be sold but not in the open auction.
 - b. They have a prearranged buyer.
 - c. The exhibitor must provide the Santa Clara County Fair with a certified check for the designated animal and fill out the appropriate paperwork prior to the Auction deadline of 6PM or within one hour of the end of the beef show on Thursday, August 1st, 2019.
 - d. Sale price of the animal must be for at least the current market price.
 - e. The purchase price must include the processing fee and any other charges normally associated with the sale.
 - f. The exhibitor will also be subject to the 7.5 % service fee/sales commission charged to all exhibitors that sell an animal.
 - g. All other Junior Auction rules still apply.
 - h. There will not be an independent or grange champion awarded in any market class, unless there are a minimum of five (5) animals in the class being owned by a minimum of three (3) different exhibitors.
 - i. Independent or Grange Exhibitors will not be able to sell more than one (1) animal through Auction if there were not more than 10 animals in the species respective market class.
 - j. If an out-of-county, grange or independent exhibitor has a Champion or Reserve Champion market animal, the animal MUST go through the auction and be subject to the open-bid process. This exhibitor may sell a second animal as long as the exhibitor complies with the aforementioned and has a prearranged buyer and certified check as stated.
4. All animals sold through the Junior Livestock Auction MUST be entered into the auction by 6PM or within one hour of the end of the beef show on Thursday, August 1st , 2019 in the Livestock Office. No scratches or substitutions will be allowed.
5. ALL EXHIBITORS SELLING ANIMALS THROUGH THE AUCTION WILL BE REQUIRED TO VERIFY THAT THEIR ANIMAL IS FREE OF DRUG RESIDUE, BY SIGNING A DECLARATION FORM FOR THE ANIMAL ENTERED INTO THE AUCTION. Drug withdrawal times for all medications given to all market animals must be strictly adhered to. Any animal that tests positive for any medication at the time of harvest will be held at the harvesting facility until resolution and disposition. THE EXHIBITOR IS RESPONSIBLE FOR ALL COSTS INCURRED.
6. All animals entered into the auction will be sold for processing. There will be no live animal sales at the auction. Small animal processing and delivery is the responsibility of the seller.
7. Animals must appear in the sale order as listed and at the proper time or they will not be sold.
8. EXHIBITORS ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR GETTING THE ANIMALS INTO THE SALE RING AND TO THE HOLDING AREA ON TIME, AND FOR RETURNING ANIMALS TO THEIR PEN AFTER SALE.

Junior Livestock Auction Rules

9. Sale animals may not be altered from standard fitting and showing condition, including but not limited to paint, dye or glitter. Champion and Reserve Champion banners are acceptable as approved by Santa Clara County Fair Management.
10. OWNERS/EXHIBITORS ARE STRONGLY URGED TO BE PRESENT AT THE AUCTION WHILE THEIR ANIMAL IS SOLD. IF EXHIBITOR CANNOT BE PRESENT, LEADER OR INSTRUCTOR MUST CONTACT THE LIVESTOCK OFFICE. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to locate a substitute to take their animal through auction with fair staff approval. If the exhibitor has filled out an auction form their animal will sell at market price and exhibitor does not get prior approval.
11. All exhibitors that have submitted completed auction paperwork are required to sell. If the exhibitor fails to show at the designated sale time, the animal will be sold at market price for resale.
12. All exhibitors/members selling animals are required to be in official uniform at the time their animal is sold.
13. JUMBO WEIGHT MARKET ANIMALS: Animals exceeding top market weights will be allowed to show and sell if meeting standards. Jumbo weight animals will sell at top weight limitation and will not be paid for excess of that limit.
14. If the harvesting facility condemns a carcass, it is the seller's responsibility to refund the buyer's money.
15. A 7.5% service fee/sales commission will be charged on all animals sold. Funds derived are used for bookkeeping, auction brochure, auction supplies, equipment, auctioneer and other such costs.
16. No awards, speeches or decorations except those approved by Santa Clara County Fair Management will be given during the auction or in the auction ring.
17. ORDER OF SALE: Eggs, Rabbits, Hogs, Beef, Lambs and Goats with Champions in the beginning of their respective species. Order is subject to change and fair staff will notify buyers as best they can if any changes occur.
18. Only market animals placed in market groups 1 & 2 are eligible for auction.
19. Sale will begin at 10:00AM on Saturday August 3rd, 2019. Champions will be sold in the beginning of their respective species. Animals will be sold individually, except for meat pen rabbits, and eggs. No payments for individual meat pen rabbits or eggs will be accepted.
- NEW!** 20. SALE MANAGEMENT: Sale Management herein referred to pertains to the Santa Clara County Fair Junior Livestock Auction Team. The information contained in any catalog and any subsequent publication was provided to the Sale Management. All activities performed by the Sale Management have been done as a service. Sale Management assumes no responsibility or liability for the accuracy of information contained herein or for any reference or warranties, whether written or oral, express or implied.
21. BUYER'S RISK: Seller retains all risk of loss to an animal prior to its being declared sold by the auctioneer. Sale Management assumes all risk of loss until such time as the animal is released to the Buyer(s) or carcass is delivered to cold storage plant.
22. BIDDING: All animals sell to the highest bidder. The bidding will be per pound except for Eggs which will be sold by the dozen or , Rabbit Meat Pens (3 rabbits), which will be sold by the lot. The Auctioneer will settle any dispute or challenge regarding bidding and his decision will be final. The Auctioneer has the right to refuse bids from anyone who has a previous record of default in payment or who has declined to make proper registration and/or credit clearance with the auction management. If a buyer(s) has not paid for a prior Auction obligation, the buyer(s) will not be allowed to register.
23. NEW BUYERS: Any buyer who did not register or purchase an animal during the 2018 livestock auctions, will be classified as a new buyer. These new buyers will need to pay in full on or before the end of the auctions.

Junior Livestock Auction Rules

24. SALE PROCEEDS: Each Auction participant shall receive their animal's sale proceeds as soon as the animal's Buyer(s) have satisfied their obligation in full. Payment to the seller will follow a regular payment schedule as determined by Auction Management.

Buyer invoice due and payable within 30 days of billing date. After that time a 2% per month service charge will apply to bills that remain unpaid. All unpaid accounts are turned over to a reputable collection agency on January 1, 2020. After that date, money received through the collection process will be issued to the exhibitor, less 10% of buyer's total sale amount to Santa Clara County Fair Junior Livestock and the collection agencies commission fee.

25. Payment for each animal shall be by cash, check or credit card, (certified check if so requested by the Auction Management) payable upon receipt of sale certificate, unless otherwise agreed in writing between the Auction Management and Buyer(s). Payment shall be in lawful money of the United States of America. In case that a suit must be brought to compel payment for any auction animal, the Buyer(s) agree to pay all attorney's fees and all collection expenses associated with the animal's purchase.

Small Animal Showmanship Rules & Guidelines:

1. American system of judging.
2. At this time, we do not offer showmanship classes for Independent exhibitors.
3. All showmanship classes must be pre-registered on an official Santa Clara County Fair entry form. **NO DAY OF SHOW ENTRIES!**
4. Only animals owned, fitted and shown by the exhibitor in Junior Small Animal Department regular classes, are allowed to be shown in showmanship.
5. Any animal that is disqualified due to weight, at time of weigh in, and it is their only animal they are still eligible to be shown in showmanship. If another animal has already weighed in and made weight, then the additional animal that was disqualified due to weight must leave the fairgrounds unless we have room.
6. Animals removed from their exhibit cages or pens, must be returned immediately following the completion of showmanship.
7. Please NOTE that for ALL classes, once you enter the arena for the next level of Showmanship, in a particular species, you now compete at that level until you advance again. You **MAY NOT** go back down a level (in that specie) at ANY future Santa Clara County Fair.
8. Showmanship first place winners are not required to show in the next level of showmanship the year they win, but they will be required to move up to the next level in the following years. (except
9. Showmanship classes will be broken into groups as follows:
 - a. 4-H Clover Showmanship – Exhibitors who are 5 years on January 1st of current year to 8 years of age on December 31st of previous year. Clovers are not eligible to show in market classes. Clovers may enter eggs.
 - b. 4-H Beginning Showmanship – Exhibitors who are 9 to 13 years of age as of January 1st of the current year and younger, who have never won a first place ribbon in Showmanship in that species category at the Santa Clara County Fair. First place, second place and third place ribbon winners may enter Novice Showmanship this year.
 - c. 4-H Novice Showmanship – Exhibitors who are 14 years of age and older as of January 1st of current year, and exhibitors 13 years of age and younger who have won a first place ribbon in Beginning Showmanship or have previously advanced to Novice Showmanship at the Santa Clara County. First place, second place and third place ribbon winners may enter Advanced Showmanship this year.
 - d. 4-H Advanced Showmanship – Exhibitors of any age, who have won a first place ribbon in Novice Showmanship of this species in prior years at the Santa Clara County Fair. Additionally, any exhibitor who has exhibited in prior years at the Santa Clara County Fair at the Advanced level must show in the Advanced Showmanship group. The first place winners of the Advanced Showmanship classes is eligible to compete in Small Animal Master Showmanship Contest, unless they have already won Small Animal Master Showmanship previously.
 - e. FFA Novice Showmanship – Exhibitors who are showing this species for the first year ever, who have NEVER shown this species previously in this or any other organization, show, or fair. The project should start no sooner than September 1st of the preceding year. The place winners of first, second and third, may enter Advanced Showmanship this year.

Small Animal Showmanship Rules

f. FFA Advanced Showmanship – Any FFA member who has shown this species in previous years and places first, second and third from the current year’s Novice Showmanship classes. The first place winners of the advanced showmanship classes is eligible to compete in the Advanced Small Animal Master Showmanship contest.

Small Animal Master Showmanship

Judging	August 4, 2019 at 12PM on the Square Dance Stage
Entry Fee	No pre-entry. Entrants based on showmanship placing.

Contestants to check in at the livestock office a minimum of 30 minutes prior to the start of the contest.

Small Animal Master Showmanship Rules & Guidelines:

1. An individual can win Small Animal Master Showmanship only once, and thereafter, is not eligible to participate in the contest.
2. Only Santa Clara County residents are eligible to participate in the Small Animal Master Showmanship contest.
3. Independent and out of county exhibitors are NOT eligible to participate in Small Animal Master Showmanship.
4. Only winners of Advanced Showmanship (in rabbits, cavies, dogs, poultry and pygmy goats) are eligible to participate in Small Animal Master Showmanship.
 - a. If the first place winner of Advanced Showmanship in one of the above categories was a previous Master Showmanship winner or if for any other reason the Advanced Showmanship winner does not participate in the Master Showmanship contest, then the second place individual from that same category would be eligible for Master Showmanship.
 - b. If the first place winner in one of the above categories is representing another category of showmanship in the master showmanship contest this year, then the next highest place individual from that same category would be eligible for master showmanship.
 - c. Exhibitors who win in multiple species MUST represent the specie they first qualified in, regardless of the association (4-H/FFA) they are representing and regardless of whether or not they qualified by taking the place of an exhibitor who placed higher than them, but is representing another category.
 - d. Participation limited to top three placers from each category.
5. 4-H and FFA exhibitors DO NOT compete against each other.
6. Results will be announced and awards will be presented shortly after the completion of the Small Animal Master Showmanship Contest.
7. Winner of the Santa Clara County Fair Master Showmanship contest will be eligible to participate in the California State Fair Master Showmanship contest. (Check in the Santa Clara County Fair Office for the California State Fair Junior Best of Show competition entry forms, rules and guidelines.)
8. All entry forms and rules will be made available by California State Fair, if you need any assistance with your entries please reach out to the Fair office.

Dog Rules & Guidelines:

1. Obedience class placements by Danish system of judging.
2. Those receiving scores as follows will be awarded the appropriate award indicated:
 - a. 1st group – blue: 190-200 points
 - b. 2nd group – red: 170-189 points
 - c. 3rd group – white: less than 170 points
 - d. Qualifying score: 170 points
3. Highest level of obedience classes to be judged first.
4. A lunch break will be taken at the judge’s discretion.
5. This show is open to any 4-H, FFA and Independent from Santa Clara County. All dogs must be owned, co-owned or leased and trained by the exhibitors.
6. Judging and scoring will be based on AKC regulations with 4-H modifications(Modification meaning an additional obedience class). Judges’ decision is final. THIS IS NOT AN AKC SANCTIONED SHOW.
7. All dogs should be trained by exhibitor.
8. All dogs must be groomed by exhibitor. Dogs should not be left unattended on grooming tables at the show. Only minor touch up grooming to be done at the show.
9. All exhibitors to check in at the time indicated on the show schedule page of this book and shall wear their exhibitor arm/band number for the duration of the show. Change armband after lunch if showing in both Obedience and Showmanship since separate numbers are used for each show.

First place, second place and third place ribbon winners may enter Novice Showmanship this year. Once you have won beginning showmanship or enter the novice level you **MAY NOT** go back to the beginning level.
 - b. **4-H Novice Showmanship** – Exhibitors who are 9-11 years of age as of January 1st, 2019 and exhibitors 12-14 years of age as of January 1st, 2019 who have NEVER shown this species category or have previously advanced to Novice Showmanship at the Santa Clara County Fair or any other fair prior to May 1st, 2019. First place, second place and third place ribbon winners may enter Advanced Showmanship this year. Once you win novice or enter the advanced level you **MAY NOT** go back to the novice level. Novice Showmanship winners are eligible for Novice Large Animal Master Showmanship.
 - c. **4-H Advanced Showmanship** – Exhibitors 14 and over. Additionally, any exhibitor who has exhibited in prior years at the Santa Clara County Fair or any other fair at the Advanced level prior to May 1st 2019 must show in the Advanced Showmanship group. The first place winners of the Advanced Showmanship classes can compete in Large Animal Master Showmanship Contest.
 - d. **FFA Novice Showmanship** – Exhibitors who are showing this specie for the first year ever, who have NEVER shown this specie previously in this or any other organization, show or fair previous to may 1st, 2019. The place winners of first, second and third, may enter Advanced Showmanship this year. Novice Showmanship winners are eligible for Novice Large Animal Master Showmanship.



Junior Livestock Showmanship Rules

e. FFA Advanced Showmanship: Exhibitors who have shown this specie in this organization or any other organization before at Santa Clara County Fair or any other Fair, prior to May 1st 2019. Exhibitor that win FFA advanced showmanship are eligible for large animal master showmanship.

Any exhibitor found to have entered the wrong showmanship class will be stripped of all awards. Second place is not entitled to the winner's awards or to participate in master showmanship if they are found to be wrong. The Judge's decision is final.

Large Animal Master Showmanship Rules & Guidelines:

1. Only open to Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, and San Benito (Horse) Counties 4-H/FFA members.
2. Grange and Independent exhibitors are not eligible to participate in Large Animal Master Showmanship, As we do not offer independent or grange showmanship at this time
3. Only winners of Novice and Advanced Showmanship (Beef, Dairy Cattle, Dairy Goats, Sheep, Swine, Horse or Market Goats.) are eligible to participate in Large Animal Master Showmanship.
 - a. If the first place winner of Novice or Advanced Showmanship in one (1) of the above categories does not participate in the Master Showmanship contest, then the second place individual from that same category would be eligible for Master Showmanship.
 - b. If the first place winner of Novice or Advanced Showmanship in one of the above categories is representing another category of showmanship in the master showmanship contest this year, then the next highest place individual from that same category would be eligible for master showmanship.
 - c. Participation limited to top two placers from each category.
 - d. Novice showmanship winners who also win advanced showmanship must show in advanced master showmanship. Regardless of if it was the first species they won or not.
 - e. Exhibitors who win in multiple species MUST represent the specie they first qualified in, regardless of the association (4-H/FFA) they are representing and regardless of whether or not they qualified by taking the place of an exhibitor who placed higher than them, but is representing another category. If they won both a novice and advanced showmanship they MUST represent for advanced showmanship.
 - f. All first place winners of Large Animal Showmanship must declare that they will be participating in the Large Animal Master Showmanship contest by 5:00PM on Friday August 2nd, 2019 or one (1) hour after the conclusion of the respective species show to the Santa Clara County Fair Livestock Office. Failure to do so will signify that first place exhibitor has forfeit their spot in the Large Animal Master Showmanship contest.
 - g. Should the second place Exhibitor in one (1) of the above species become eligible for the Large Animal Master Showmanship Contest it is their responsibility to declare they will be participating in the Large Animal Master Showmanship contest by 5:00PM or one (1) hour after the conclusion of the respective species show to the Santa Clara County Fair Livestock Office.
 - h. Should neither the first or second place winner choose not to participate in the Large Animal Master Showmanship contest then no one will represent that species.
4. If an eligible exhibitor forfeits their position in the master showmanship contest, the next highest place individual from the same category will be eligible for Large Animal Master Showmanship. Participation is limited to top two placers from each category.
5. Results and individual placing will be announced, posted and awards will be presented shortly after completion of the Large Animal Master Showmanship Contest.

Large Animal Master Showmanship Rules

6. 4-H and FFA exhibitors DO NOT compete against each other.
7. Winner of the Santa Clara County Fair Master Showmanship contest will be eligible to participate in the California State Fair Master Showmanship contest. (Check in the Santa Clara County Fair Office for the California State Fair Junior Best of Show competition entry forms, rules and guidelines.)
8. There is no restrictions on the number of times an exhibitor can participate in and/or win Large Animal Master Showmanship at the Santa Clara County Fair.

Junior Livestock Clean Pen Rules

At least once each day, the livestock chairs will walk through the livestock area inspecting pens, tack areas and the livestock surrounding areas. They will be looking for cleanliness and the general appearance of assigned pen areas for each exhibitor. If necessary they will ask exhibitors to clean pens, sweep areas or perform needed tasks to ensure areas are clean and safe for animals, exhibitors and the public alike.

Failure of exhibitors to correct any requested tasks may result in the inability to show animals or ejection from the Santa Clara County Fair all together.

Rules:

1. All pens, including tack areas, must be cleaned by 9:00 AM daily.
2. Inspections may take place any time between 9:00 AM and 5:00 PM daily and by noon on Saturday.
3. Inspections will be done daily including show days.
4. Each club or chapter must have an Educational Display at their pens for each species.
5. Each pen is required to have a stall card for each animal with: Exhibitors Name, Club/ Chapter/ etc, Animals Name, Ear Tag Number, and Breed info.
6. Exhibitors are responsible for cleaning the front aisle and all around their pens and are responsible for keeping tack areas and aisles clean and neat.
7. Animals are expected to be kept clean and free of manure.
8. Sheep, goats and pigs are expected to have clean water available to them at all times.
9. Cattle drinking area is expected to remain neat and clear of manure.

PLEASE NOTE - If you have a leased horse, your signed Lease Agreement **MUST** be signed and Notarized **NO LATER** than **MARCH 21, 2019**. Ownership must **ALSO** be no later than **March 21, 2019**. By request of show committee, exhibitors may be required to show **ORIGINAL** notarized Lease Agreement, notarized Ownership Form, or Registration papers, showing entrant's name, upon check-in. Failure to provide proof will result in immediate disqualification from show and forfeiture of all awards. A bill of sale will not be acceptable. To expedite the day of show check-in process, exhibitors are strongly advised to provide the Fair Office with notarized Lease Agreement, notarized Ownership Form, or Registration Papers prior to the horse show date.

Horse Rules & Guidelines:

1. All State Rules for California Fairs, Local, Livestock and State Horse Show rules apply. Specific rules are per USEF Show rules (Gymkhana – CGA rules apply.)
2. State rules for California Fairs require a \$5.00 drug fee for each horse entered.
3. Ownership or Lease: Any horse exhibited in the junior or youth division must be owned or leased by the junior exhibitor showing the horse or owned by the junior exhibitor's parent, stepparent, sibling, half-sibling, step-sibling, grandparent, step grandparent, sibling's spouse, half sibling's spouse, step-sibling's spouse or legal guardian (as evidenced by court documents), or owned by the institution in which the junior exhibitor is enrolled as a ward. Separate legal entities, such as family corporations, trusts, or partnerships, are also authorized owners of the youth exhibitor's horse so long as all legal and equitable owners and beneficiaries of the legal entity are individuals specifically authorized by this rule. "Owned" means, in addition to other legitimate methods of acquiring ownership, the bona fide legal ownership obtained for adequate consideration in reasonable relationship with the actual market value of the horse.
4. Juniors may only handle stallion foals born in the current year.
5. National Horse Breed Association Registered Purebred animals cannot be entered as a grade or unregistered animal.
6. Registered animals must have original registration papers only (no photocopies) naming the exhibitor as the owner.
7. Grade animals owned by an exhibitor require a notarized bill of sale or notarized statement of ownership naming the exhibitor as the owner. Document should be notarized no later than 3/21/2019. Original ownership papers (no photocopies) for half-breed, appendix, pink-papered & breeding stock I.D must name the exhibitor or a family member as owner to be accepted into division 3102 and 3104 (see Rule #3 above).

Horses

8. Leased horse agreements MUST be notarized. Documents should be notarized no later than 3/21/2019.
9. All registration papers and notarized statements must be checked no later than one (1) hour before the start of the show
10. Random testing of horses is possible. If a drug has been given to your horse for any reason, within 72 hours of the show, a drug declaration must be filed with the horse show supervisor.
11. Horses and ponies entered in the show must only be ridden by owners or leasers only.
12. Horses may be checked for soundness upon arrival. The Santa Clara County Fair staff and livestock committee may make a determination as to soundness and can dismiss from the grounds any horse deemed unable to perform, or where it is in the best interest of the horse.
13. All horse exhibitors are responsible for their own veterinarian expenses.
14. Exhibitors are required to care for, prepare, and show their animals.
15. A horse or pony may be shown by one (1) exhibitor only, in any one (1) division.
16. Adult help (including leaders, parents and trainers) in grooming, exercising and preparing for show, or coaching from the rail during competition may cause the exhibitor and/or horse/pony to be disqualified. Disqualifications may consist of withholding ribbons/awards, removal from the horse show grounds, elimination of further competitions at the Santa Clara County Fair.
17. Any violation of 4-H, FFA, Santa Clara County Fair or State Rules for California Fairs including Code of Conduct violations within these organizations, will be grounds for immediate disqualification from this show and will result in loss of all awards. Participation in the SCCF for the following years will be on a probationary status or possibly denied.
18. All junior exhibitors must have "on ground" supervision by a responsible adult.
19. TWO-MINUTE GATE WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED. A five-minute tack change will be allowed upon request.
20. Tie-downs, running martingales, mechanical hackamores, etc. are prohibited, with the exception of Gymkhana classes. Bareback pads are prohibited. Horse boots and wraps are prohibited in competition with exception of Gymkhana classes. Boots or wraps may be used in competition only if a veterinarian's note has been given to the horse show competition, specifying the need for equipment, prior to the competition. Boots and wraps may be used in the warm up areas.
21. LUNCH BREAKS – No set time.
22. Safety approved hard hat with harness strap in place must be worn whenever mounted anywhere on at the show facility.
23. State Fair qualification – FFA, 4-H and Independent exhibitors will be entered into the same classes but will only compete against those in their respective organizations. The highest placing individual from each organization in each class will qualify for the California State Fair Horse Show. See California State Fair for more information on this rule.
24. Exhibitors entered into a Walk/Trot class cannot cross over to a canter class. Walk/Trot classes limited to beginner riders, must be in their 1st or 2nd year of showing. Horse/Rider combination limited to two (2) years only.

Any animals deemed to have any unethical or unwanted condition (disease or pests, etc.) will be excused from participating and must leave the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds Immediately

Market Goat Rules & Guidelines:

1. Danish system of judging for market groups.
 - a. Flat ribbons for market groups 1,2 and 3.
2. American system of judging for market order.
 - a. Rosettes for 1st and 2nd places.
3. An animal may be removed from the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds and disqualified from show if the animal cannot be controlled by the exhibitor or presents danger to any person at the discretion of Santa Clara County Fair Management. This rule applies to Santa Clara County Fair shows and any other Santa Clara County Fair activities.
4. Upon arrival at the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds, all goats must have a permanent Scrapie tag which EXACTLY matches the bill of sale (flock # and individual #). If any animal is to lose their scrapie tag the Santa Clara County Fair office must be notified immediately and you will be given instructions for a missing scrapie tag or fair tag.
5. All Local, State rules for California Fairs and health rules apply and must be adhered to at all time.
6. After weigh in, market goats will be divided into weight lots within the market weight range for convenience of judging and lot uniformity.
7. Market goats weighing in the jumbo weight range may show in the jumbo market class but will not be eligible to show in Champion Drive or receive any Champion awards.
8. Jumbo class goats will be eligible to sell at auction but will be paid for a maximum of top market weight.
9. Market goats exceeding the top jumbo weight must leave the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds by close of barn on Sunday, July 29th at 9:00PM and are ineligible to participate in any classes at the Santa Clara County Fair. 2. All Entrants are required to care for, prepare, groom and handle their entered horses. For youth exhibitors, adult help is permitted to ensure safety.

The exception to this is eggs which will be sold by the dozen or, rabbit meat pens (3 rabbits), which will be sold by the lot. Each will be sold to the highest bidder. Auctioneer has final say. All sales are final, and buyers are responsible for all costs including process and packaging.

New buyers can pre-register online at thefair.org; Pre-registered buyers will receive two (2) admission tickets into the fair buyers must register by July 12th to receive tickets The assigned buyer number will be ready for pick up the day of the auction. Buyers may also register in person the day of the auction.
