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Important Information for Exhibitors

1. All species pre-tagging is the responsibility of the exhibitors, leaders and/or advisors. The pre-tagging request process is to be completed by leaders/advisors. The Leader/Advisor is to fill out the pre-tagging request form completely when emailed by the Exhibits office. If you do not receive an email, contact the Santa Clara County Fair office for tagging materials and procedures. Pre-tagging kits can be dropped off at the fairground's front office. Refer to the important dates page for when beef and sheep/goats/swine pre-tagging kits are due. DNA and all applicable paperwork **MUST BE IN THE FAIR OFFICE BY THE DEADLINE**. Failure to have your market animal pre-tagged will prohibit your animal from being entered in the 2025 Santa Clara County Fair – **NO EXCEPTIONS WILL BE MADE.** NEW!
2. RV spaces will be available for exhibitors and their families who wish to stay on the SCC Fairgrounds from Saturday, July 26, 2025, to Monday, August 4, 2025. If you would like an RV space during the SCC Fair, please check the online entry system or contact the SCC Fair Office for more details. We will have RV forms available online at www.thefair.org by June 1, 2025. All completed RV forms are to be emailed to mbeckwith@thefair.org. **The first submitted forms will have priority as we are limited to 50 RV spots this year.** One (1) vehicle parking pass is included with the price of the RV pass, but exhibitors and other guests staying on the SCC Fairgrounds in the RV area are still required to purchase admission to the SCC Fair and parking passes for any additional vehicles. *Please note only one (1) vehicle per RV can be parked in the RV area.* Due to limited space, RV forms submitted to the fair office after July 3, 2025, may not be accommodated.
3. It is required that each animal have a stall card (with Exhibitor Name, Animal Name, and Club/Chapter) and each club/chapter have a sign for each species. Decorations are required for the 2025 Santa Clara County Fair.
4. The Santa Clara County Fair is open to the following participants:
 - a. Large Animal Market and Breeding classes and Small Animal Market classes are open to residents of Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, Monterey, San Benito, Alameda, and San Mateo Counties only. (Out of county exhibitors please refer to the Species Limits section on Rules and Guidelines for more information). A lottery will be held for each specie to decide which out of county animals will be allowed to show. Email mbeckwith@thefair.org for more information.
 - b. Small animal classes, excluding small animal market classes, are open to all exhibitors ages 5 to 19 years old as of January 1, 2025, from all counties.
 - c. Dairy Cattle and Dairy Goats classes are open to all exhibitors from all counties.
 - d. The Horse show will be open to Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, Monterey, San Benito, Alameda, and San Mateo Counties.
 - e. All showmanship classes are open to 4-H and FFA exhibitors of Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, Monterey, San Benito, Alameda, and San Mateo Counties.
 - f. All Exhibitors must be in good standing with the Santa Clara County Fair and their respective organizations.
5. **Buyers Coalition** The Santa Clara County Fair is proud to announce that we will continue the Buyers Coalition this year! The Buyer's Coalition allows for donations to be collected from local businesses and community members. Those donations will be used to buy livestock from the Santa Clara County Youth Livestock Auction. The meat that is bought at the auction will then be donated to local food banks and soup kitchens.

6. **Prop 12** A bill of sale and Proposition 12 certificate must be turned in for market swine with pre-tagging paperwork. Market Swine Exhibitors will have to submit Proposition 12 required certificate from a third party certified breeder as required by the law. Self-Certification is no longer allowed.

RULES AND GUIDELINES

Code of Conduct for All Exhibitors

This Code of Conduct was developed in cooperation with the California State 4-H, California FFA Association, California State Grange, Western Fairs Association, and other Agricultural organizations. The purpose of this code and rules are to help ensure that animals are treated safely and humanely, food safety is ensured, and that all exhibitors are given a fair chance to compete in a positive environment. **This Code of Conduct and Rules & Guidelines apply to all exhibitors showing animals in competition at the Santa Clara County Fair, including Junior and Open Class Exhibitors in all classes offered.** This Code and Rules may be revised or updated as new standards require.

Notice to Parents, Leaders, & Advisors

The purpose of the Junior Livestock Shows at the Santa Clara County Fair is twofold:

1. To teach Youth the proper and ethical techniques for healthy Livestock production according to the standards set in place by the Livestock Industry and Breed Organizations as well as National, State, and local Food and Health requirements. This includes the preparation of the said animal for show or sale by the Youth, not the parent, family or leader/advisor.
2. To encourage fair competition and ensure a level playing field for all exhibitors using the most ethical and healthy practices toward the animals being shown while encouraging good sportsmanship and positive treatment of all other exhibitors, their families and Leaders/Advisors.

To ensure that **all youth, as well as parents and youth leaders working with junior exhibitors**, are clear as to the responsibilities, they have with regard to guiding their youth in the proper and legal techniques, below are listed the most common prohibited practices and procedures which are considered to be deceptive, fraudulent, unethical, and inhumane in the care, fitting, preparation and showing of all classes of livestock:

Ethical Showing- Prohibited Actions

Any of the following actions are grounds for immediate disqualification, forfeiture of all awards, and immediate removal of animal(s) from the Fairgrounds. This applies to ALL EXHIBITORS, LEADERS, ADVISORS, and PARENTS.

1. The use of any illegal drugs on animals.
2. The use of any substances to alter the physical appearance of an animal entered in livestock events including, but not limited to, dyes, colored products on legs or body, hair builders, using banned fitting products or using them in inappropriate places, drenching or having a drenching gun on grounds.
3. Abuse (including cursing/inappropriate language/behavior or fighting) of any type toward any animal or person including exhibitors, their families, Leaders/Advisors, judges, volunteers, or Fair Staff.
4. Allowing any non-exhibitor to bathe/clip/fit animals or groom/braid/prepare horses at the fair. Any senior youth exhibitor may assist a younger exhibitor (mentoring is encouraged). Parents, leaders/advisors, or non-exhibitor siblings may only assist in the case of safety concerns.
5. Use or possession by youth of any smoking materials, alcohol, or prohibited substances of any kind.
6. Interference with any judge, show staff, volunteers, or management carrying out their duties, either before, during or after any class. Interference may be (but is not limited to) arguing, loud, disruptive, or abusive language or commentary toward officials, management, or judges.
7. Addressing ANY dispute to a judge. **JUDGES' DECISIONS ARE FINAL** and not subject to Protests. By signing the Entry Form and this Code of Conduct, all Exhibitors and their parents, family and leaders agree that they understand and agree to this rule. Harassment in any form towards a judge, volunteers, Fair Staff or impugning the reputation of the Fair, a judge, volunteers or Fair Staff on **ANY** social media or any other platform by any Exhibitor (or Exhibitor's friend, family, or leader) because of any dispute will not be tolerated.
8. For matters that can be disputed, the correct procedure for any dispute is to file an Official Protest and allow an adjudication process to examine the issue and make a finding. Any form of continued harassment without having followed the Official Protest procedure may result in disqualification of the exhibitor in question. In such a case, any pending Official Protests will also become immediately void.
9. Harassment of or interference with competing exhibitors or their leaders/advisors in the course of preparing for, showing in, or after a class.
10. Failure to follow any other applicable Santa Clara County Fair or State Rules for California Fair rules.

Code of Conduct for All Exhibitors

Any exhibitor, parent, or leader who has been found to have engaged in any prohibited practice shall be immediately disqualified from competition at the Santa Clara County Fair and shall forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds in accordance with the Santa Clara County Fair rules.

General Procedural Rules

1. All livestock exhibitors must have proof of ownership of their animals which may be made available to Fair Management at their request. All animals must be owned, or leased in the case of horses, by and under the exhibitor's daily care in accordance with the rules of the Santa Clara County Fair.
2. The date shown on the Bill of Sale, Attestation of Ownership in the case of small animals or Statement of Ownership in the case of exhibitor bred animals, is the official ownership date. Registered breeding livestock must show the exhibitor as owner of the animal on the breed association papers or certificate. See Ownership and Bill of Sale Requirement section of this book for ownership requirements for non-market animals.
3. Any animal that has been previously sold as a market animal through another fair or livestock show via auction or sale, whether or not there has been an actual change of ownership (progress level shows excluded), is prohibited from being entered at the Santa Clara County Fair. Misrepresenting ownership or any method used to misrepresent the age of an animal in a class in which it will be shown is prohibited. Falsely claiming to be the owner of an animal for the purpose of showing the animal for another party is prohibited.
4. All junior exhibitors are required to care for and groom their own animals while at the Santa Clara County Fair. For the animals' safety and well-being, daily access to fresh, clean water and appropriate feed as well as daily exercise must be provided.
5. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain, free of prohibited drug residues. By entering the animal in the Santa Clara County Fair, the owner exhibitor, leader, advisor and/or parent or responsible person expressly gives their voluntary consent to allow Show Management to collect/obtain any specimens of DNA, tissue, urine, saliva, blood, or any other substances from the animal entered to be used for testing. Such specimens may be collected at random, whether the owner of the animal is present or not. If the laboratory report on the analysis of DNA, tissue, saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of DNA, tissue, urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory, to which it is sent, is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, leader, advisor, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.
6. Animals entered in classes other than market classes, where they will NOT enter the food chain, may only be given drugs in accordance with applicable federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations, and rules, however livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.
7. Allowable and acceptable practices of physical preparation of the animal for show include clipping of hair, trimming of hooves, and dehorning. Any surgical procedure, injections or insertion of foreign material, substance or drug, or the external application of any substance (irritant, counter-irritant or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation or appearance of an animal's body is prohibited and ground for disqualification. This includes vegetable oil, silicone, air, or any other substance used to alter the shape of the animal.
8. Any artificial or abnormal means used to balance the udder, including use of mechanical contrivance, the injection of fluid or drugs, setting the teats and/or occluding (sealing the ends) with a mechanical contrivance or use of a chemical preparation is prohibited. Treating or massaging the udder or its attachment with an irritant or counter irritant is also prohibited.

Code of Conduct for All Exhibitors

9. Inhumane handling or showing practices are strictly prohibited. This includes but is not limited to devices used to strike animals to induce swelling, using electrical devices for electrical stimulation, liquid diets for lambs or goats, excessive shrinking, excessive exercise or tying animals with their feet off the ground. Use of any of these or other cruel and abusive practices is grounds for immediate disqualification.
10. Correct show ring decorum is always to be maintained. All judges, fair and livestock show management, show officials, contestants and onlookers are to be treated with courtesy, respect, and cooperation. Interference of any kind with the judge, fair, or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, breed classifiers, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. Any violation of this rule may result in disqualification and/or removal of offender from the Fairgrounds.
11. Any owner, exhibitor, trainer, leader, advisor, or responsible person who knowingly cooperates or assists another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this Code of Conduct will be subject to disciplinary action by Fair Management.
12. Under this Code of Conduct, the owner/exhibitor, their leader, advisor, and parent(s) have sole responsibility for their exhibited animal's condition and are responsible for any and all illegal/ disqualifying substances that may have been administered to said animal, whether or not he/she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in question.
13. Animal health inspections or diagnostic tests may be required before or after animals arrive on the showgrounds for exhibitor and animal safety, or to inaugurate disease control procedures which may become necessary in emergencies as determined by animal health officials. In such cases, show management reserves the right to require animal health certificates from a licensed veterinarian. Exhibitors are responsible for any associated costs for said testing/examination.
14. Any violation of the "Santa Clara County Fair Code of Conduct", State Rules, Santa Clara County Fair Rules, or Residue Avoidance Program, may result in forfeiture of premiums, awards, disqualification, and may result in probationary status and/or loss of eligibility for future participation in organized livestock competition. Based on evidence provided by the livestock show, possible civil penalties may be imposed by the proper authorities on exhibitors in violation of the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act or the Animal Mistreatment, Neglect, and Abandonment Laws that apply on the local, state, and national levels. Other cooperating shows will be notified of the action taken by show management, which may affect the eligibility of the individual, group, or sponsoring organization for participation at other shows.
15. Exhibitors shall conduct themselves in a professional manner on the Fairgrounds. This includes, but is not limited to appropriate dress, physical contact, and courteous language. The following activities/behaviors are inappropriate and in the interest of safety and a positive environment are strictly prohibited. Exhibitors engaging in said behaviors/activities may be disqualified and/or become subject to the penalties outlined in Paragraph 14 above:
 - a. Obscene, bullying, threatening language, roughhousing, abusive behavior toward people or animals.
 - b. Smoking is prohibited at all times on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds. This includes smoking of any and all materials, including but not limited to tobacco and non-tobacco substances, vape pens or electronic cigarettes.
 - c. Consumption of alcoholic beverages by minors is strictly prohibited at any time.
 - d. Use of any illegal substances.
 - e. Possession and/or use of firearms or firecrackers will result in immediate removal from the Fairgrounds.
 - f. Damage caused to any facilities or equipment.
 - g. The inappropriate use of riding crops or whips, lariats, etc. used to control animals.
 - h. No bull rings.
16. Youth exhibitors must be chaperoned at all times by an adult over the age of 21.
17. Sale by Exhibitors of any items except for auction animals, fur, and feather entries, requires express permission of Fair Management. This includes all fundraising activities (food, drink, newspaper/periodical subscriptions, etc.). Permission may be requested from Santa Clara County Fair Management PRIOR to the sale of any items. A Vendor fee may be required.
18. Exhibitors are responsible for the proper and humane care of their animals and any other exhibit which may require care (i.e., a garden installation). Santa Clara County Fair is not responsible for providing food, water, or supervision for said animals/exhibits. Exhibitors are further responsible for keeping animal pens and areas clean and to abide by all fire codes. Exhibitors who may be reported to management for neglect or abuse of their animal will be subject to penalties as outlined in Paragraph 5 and 14 above.
19. Barns will close prior to the closing of the fair and will reopen at 7:00am the following morning. If livestock shows are still in progress in the barn past above set barn closure times, the barns shall close one (1) hour after the completion of that show.

Code of Conduct for All Exhibitors

20. Unless expressly authorized by Santa Clara County Fair Management staff, exhibitors are not permitted to be in the barns during the hours of closure.
21. Youth exhibitors that stay overnight at the SCC Fairgrounds in the RV Area must be chaperoned by an adult 25 years of age or older.

Official Protest Procedure

1. Protests will be considered only if there has been a violation of State or Local Rules that have not been enforced. Decisions of judges, veterinarians, weighmasters, breed callers, tail dock officials and timers cannot be protested and are final.
2. All Protests must be accompanied by a deposit of \$500.00 (cash, money order or certified check made payable to the fair). NOTE: The deposit will be returned if the protest is upheld. If the protest is upheld, the violator may be held liable for any portion of the direct costs incurred by the fair in the course of the protest resolution. Failure to reimburse the fair shall be cause for disallowing future entries in any of the network of California fairs.
3. Protests can only be filed by an exhibitor being affected by a violation of State or Local Rules, their parent/guardian, or leader/advisor.
4. Time to File a Protest:
 - a. All protests must be filed in a timely manner, within 24 hours of the alleged rule violation. A protest can be filed prior to the fair and prior to the conclusion of the fair. Protests will not be accepted after the fair has ended.
 - b. The fair will make every effort to resolve protests as quickly as possible. All exhibitors by entering an exhibit and all persons by filing a protest, agree to cooperate with Fair Management to resolve protests in a timely manner.
 - c. Protests shall be adjudicated by Fair Management.
 - d. Fair Management decisions may only be appealed at the next regularly scheduled board meetings, if:
 - i. The decision upholds a Local Rule that circumvents or is not in the spirit of a State Rule(s);
 - ii. The individual can substantiate new and credible information that was not available at the time of the local decision; or
 - iii. There was inappropriate adjudication at the Fair Management level that may have included conflict of interest, lack of due process, or a significant misinterpretation of rules.
5. Any exhibit involved in a filed protest before or during judging is eligible to compete until the protest is resolved.
6. Classes that involve a protested exhibit will not become official until the protest is resolved.
 - a. In championship or special award classes that involve the protested exhibit the judge shall also select 1st and 2nd runners-up in case of disqualification.
 - b. In the case of protest, the unofficial judging results may be used to prepare the sale list and other necessary information.
7. At the discretion of the CEO, judging can be delayed to allow time for the fair to resolve the protest if to do so does not unreasonably delay or disrupt the operations of the remainder of the fair judging and auction events.
8. Prior to judging the affected class, fairs may announce that an entry has been protested.
9. All questions concerning competition or non-protestable disputes or differences with staff or the exhibition not provided for under the State or Local Rules shall be referred to the CEO or their designee, whose decision shall be final.
10. Violations of State Rules may be appealed to F&E in writing.
11. An individual may appeal to F&E only after adjudication at the local level and only if:
 - a. The decision upholds a Local Rule that circumvents or is not in the spirit of a State Rule(s);
 - b. The individual can substantiate new and credible information that was not available at the time of the local decision; or
 - c. There was inappropriate adjudication at the local level that may have included conflict of interest, lack of due process, or a significant misinterpretation of rules.
12. A fair or state, national or international organization or subdivision thereof which has a significant stake in the interpretation of rules affecting the network of California fairs may make an appeal directly to F&E concerning multiple-fair issues, industry-wide issues, unavoidable conflict of interest or assistance in enforcing its own organization rules.
13. No protest will be accepted unless it:
 - a. Is filed or received, in writing, with a signed original and a signed duplicate copy;
 - b. Clearly states which rule has been violated;

Code of Conduct for All Exhibitors

- c. States when the protestor first became aware of the facts and rule violation;
 - d. States the facts relied upon for the basis of the protest;
 - e. States that the protestor will cooperate with the investigation of the protest and that the protestor will be available and agrees to attend any hearing held to resolve the protest at the time and place directed by F&E;
 - f. Includes the names of supporting witnesses, with accessible phone numbers; and
 - g. Describes or attaches any documents relating to the protest, which must include the written decision issued by the local arbitrating body.
14. Fairs & Expositions Branch (F&E) must receive the appeal in writing within 24 hours from receipt of notice of local decision.
15. A hearing may be conducted at the discretion of F&E. The F&E Branch Chief may consult with and/or request that members of the State Rules Advisory Committee participate in any hearing.
16. Once the Branch Chief has ruled on an appeal to F&E, no additional protest or appeal will be considered relating to that incident.

Entry Memo of Understanding

****This Agreement is to be read and signed by Exhibitor, Parent or Legal Guardian, County Extension Agent (CEA) or 4-H or FFA Leader and submitted with Entry****

In compliance with the USDA Wholesome Meat Act, it is the policy of the Santa Clara County Fair that all animals entered in competition are free and clear of drug residue upon arrival at the fairgrounds and remain so during the entire run of the Fair. The Santa Clara County Fair requires exhibitors of market animals to sign a Medication Declaration Form. It is also required that breeding animals on medication also declare such treatment on a Medication Declaration Form. Administration of any drugs/substances not approved by the FDA and/or USDA is strictly prohibited. Animals under the care of a licensed veterinarian and/or taking any type of performance enhancing medication to include, but not limited to steroids, diuretics, anti-inflammatory, tranquilizers, and painkillers, are ineligible for competition. Exhibitors with questions regarding medications and/or eligibility should consult with the Veterinarian prior to competition.

Santa Clara County Fair Management may arrange to have a show veterinarian on call for the exhibitors' convenience and the safety and protection of the animals. All calls and/or treatments, emergency or otherwise, will be charged to the exhibitor/owner of the treated animal, not to the Santa Clara County Fair. Any fees are to be discussed directly with the veterinarian before treatment. All medication administered during the livestock show must be administered by the Show Veterinarian and a written medication record must be filed. Animals receiving performance enhancing drugs for any reason (e.g., steroids, diuretics, anti-inflammatories, tranquilizers, and painkillers, etc.) are ineligible for competition.

The undersigned Exhibitor and his/her Parent or Legal Guardian, County Extension Agent (CEA) or 4-H or FFA Leader agrees to submit the animal entered, breeding and/or market, to inspection by any veterinarian or testing agency appointed by Santa Clara County Fair Management and to have such animal tested as may be deemed necessary by Fair Management at any time. Santa Clara County Fair Management also reserves the right to have ultrasound, DNA, tissue, urine, saliva, blood, or any other substances laboratory analysis done on any animal entered for competition. Breeding entries do not enter the food chain and are therefore not subject to the USDA Wholesome Meat Act, however both market and breeding entries will be closely screened for any performance enhancing compounds. This includes, but is not limited to, steroids, diuretics, anti-inflammatories, tranquilizers, and painkillers. The analysis and conclusions reached by the veterinarian and/or testing agency shall be final and conclusive without recourse through protest.

In the event any animal tests positive for such substances and is declared by the veterinarian or testing agency to be in violation of any drug regulations, or in the event that any DNA test is required, and the DNA Analysis test does not match, the animal and the exhibitor of said animal becomes immediately ineligible for this year's competition and/or auction, and all other entries by said exhibitor will be immediately disqualified and all titles, awards, prizes, auction proceeds, premiums, scholarships and market/floor money shall be forfeit. If there is interference from family members or leaders/advisors, they may also be required to leave the premises for the remainder of the Fair at the discretion of Fair Management. Fair Management's decision on drugging/DNA issues shall be final, without recourse by appeal.

The Santa Clara County Fair or any officer, director, employee, independent contractor, or agent thereof, including, without limitation, any veterinarian or testing agency appointed by the Management (collectively referred to as the Released Parties) shall be held harmless from any action as a result of decisions rendered as a result of this rule. The undersigned Exhibitor further releases the Released Parties from any and all claims or demands whatsoever in connection with the inspection or testing of any such animal or any ruling or action taken by reason of the conclusions of such veterinarian or testing agency.

The undersigned Exhibitor and his/her Parent or Legal Guardian, County Extension Agent (CEA) or 4-H or FFA Leader hereby certify that each has read, understands, and will abide by the Code of Conduct, Memo of Understanding above and all rules and regulations of the Santa Clara County Fair as delineated in the current 2025 Santa Clara County Fair Book. The undersigned further certify that they have not administered any substance not approved by the FDA and/or USDA to any animal entered in this Livestock Show. Further, they confirm that they are aware that if they have administered a drug that is FDA approved for the species entered, the time it takes for a drug to dissipate and leave no drug residue in the system may be longer than the labeled withdrawal time for most drugs. The undersigned certifies that any approved drugs will be administered in a time frame to ensure compliance with the requirement that no drug residue would be present at the time of the arrival on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds.

Exhibitor/Owner understands and agrees that, once animals arrive on the fairgrounds, they must remain free and clear of all drug and chemical residue. Drug tests that are positive for residue are grounds for immediate disqualification.

Rules and Guidelines

Rules Preface

The purposes of these rules are to:

- a. Ensure educational and equitable competition.
- b. Provide competition consistency; and
- c. Maximize exhibitor and public safety.

The Santa Clara County Fair follows the State Rules for California Fairs. Those rules allow that the local Fairs' rules may be more restrictive in their implementation but may not have any rules in direct conflict with State Rules. As a result, some Santa Clara County Fair rules may be worded slightly differently or be more restrictive. This is permitted under the State Rules for California Fairs. Compliance with all rules of the Santa Clara County Fair is delineated in this Fair Book and all State Rules for California Fairs are mandatory and a condition for entry for all Junior, 4-H, FFA, Grange, Independent, and Adult Exhibitors. By submitting your entry, you confirm your agreement to comply with all stated rules.

****PLEASE REMEMBER** Exhibitors are responsible for entering their animals/items in the correct Divisions and for checking their entry information prior to submitting each form. Any discrepancies or errors in the Exhibitors' entries are the sole responsibility of the Exhibitor. All entry corrections must be made prior to the start of Judging for the class entered, and awards may not be made for exhibits which have not been corrected. Santa Clara County Fair Management and/or Department Supervisors/Chairs are not responsible for finding errors on any Exhibitor entries.

General Rules:

Interpretation of Rules:

1. Management of the Santa Clara County Fair (including the Executive Director, the Fair Manager, Team Leaders, Chairs, and any others as designated by the Executive Director or Fair Manager) reserves the right to interpret the following Rules and Regulations and to settle and determine all questions/differences in regard thereto or otherwise arising out of, connected with, or incident to the Santa Clara County Fair, along with all rules as shown in the "2025 State Rules for California Fairs" as delineated by the Divisions of Fairs and Expositions apply to this Fair.

Species Limits:

2. All exhibitors at the Santa Clara County Fair are limited as to the number of large market animals they may show. No exhibitor may exhibit more than four (4) total of large market animals of any species – steer, market goat, lamb, or hog. ***EXCEPTION*** The exhibitor chosen to show the Heritage Hog for the Clover Foundation is the only exception to this rule. That exhibitor may raise a total of five (5) large market animals, including the Heritage Hog.
3. **Out of County exhibitors** from Santa Cruz, Monterey, San Benito, Alameda, and San Mateo counties are limited in the number of market animals and some breeding animals, which they may exhibit at the Santa Clara County Fair. Please see the out of county species limits details below:
 - a. **Small Animals:** Meat pen rabbits, meat pen chickens, turkeys, and eggs will only allow 10 out of county market animals/entries per species, with 1 entry per division, per exhibitor. The first 10 out of county entries in each division will fill those spots.
 - b. **Large Animals:** Market goats, sheep, beef, and swine will only allow 10 out of county market animals/entries per species, with 1 entry per division, per exhibitor. Out of county exhibitors looking to exhibit any of the large animal species must submit a Lottery Form. A lottery drawing will be held, and the 10 selected animals will be allowed to show. Contact mbeckwith@thefair.org for more information. Breeding market goats, sheep, beef, and swine will be limited to space available. After entries have closed if space cannot accommodate these animals, exhibitors will be notified by Fair Management and entry fees reimbursed.

Heritage Hog

4. The Clover Foundation will select one (1) exhibitor to raise its Heritage Hog.
 - a. The Heritage Hog will not count towards the exhibitor's limit of four (4) large market animals, nor the one (1) auction animal.
 - b. The Heritage Hog will be entered as "Heritage Hog" swine entry under independent in the online entry system and will be judged for market readiness ONLY. The Heritage Hog will not be eligible for Champion or Reserve Champion.
 - c. The Heritage Hog may be used as the exhibitor's showmanship animal.
 - d. The animal must be owned by the exhibitor for a minimum of 60 days. See Important Dates page for ownership date.
 - e. If the Heritage Hog does not meet the market weight minimum it will be sold at the Junior Livestock Auction at the minimum market weight but will not be harvested until that minimum market weight is met. Should the Heritage Hog be over the maximum market weight it will be sold at the top market and the buyer will not pay for the excess over that top market weight.
 - f. All proceeds from the sale of the Heritage Hog will go to the Clover Foundation, including add-ons.

Exhibitor Divisions and Age Requirements:

5. **Small Animals**
 - a. **Pygmy Goats, Dogs, Breeding Poultry, Eggs:** Juniors, per state rules for California Fairs rules: Minimum age of 5, as of January 1st of the current year. Open to exhibitors of Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, San Benito, Monterey, Alameda, and San Mateo Counties.
 - b. **Rabbits & Cavies:** Juniors, per ARBA rules, minimum age of 5 as of January 1st of current year, maximum age of 19 as of January 1st of current year. Open to exhibitors of all Counties.
 - c. **Market Animals - Beef, sheep, swine, market goats, market poultry, and rabbit meat pens. Breeding beef, sheep, swine, boar goats, and horse:** Juniors, age 9 or older, as of January 1st of the current year. Eggs may be entered by primary exhibitors. Open to exhibitors from Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, San Benito, Monterey, Alameda, and San Mateo Counties. Please see department rules for specifics.
 - d. **Dairy cattle and dairy goats:** Juniors, age 9 or older as of January 1st of the current year. Open to exhibitors of all Counties.
 - e. **Open Exhibitors:** For rules and restrictions please refer to Open Livestock Book.
6. **4-H, FFA and Grange**
 - a. Exhibitors shall abide by their organization's membership rules.

Rules and Guidelines

7. **Independents**

- a. Must be 5 years old as of January 1st of current year to participate in the Santa Clara County Fair. Exhibitors are eligible to compete/exhibit through December 31 of the year in which they turn 19 years of age.
8. All Youth Exhibitors must be in good standing with their respective organizations. If the Santa Clara County Fair is notified by the organization that a youth exhibitor is no longer a member in good standing, that exhibitor may then be ineligible to participate as an independent, if documented disciplinary action involving their projects has been taken against them by 4-H, FFA or Grange Organizations. Duration of ineligibility will be determined on a case by case, basis by Santa Clara County Fair Management.

Ownership and Bill of Sale Requirements

9. All large animals must be owned by the Exhibitor by the dates as specified in the respective species sections. EXCEPTION: Horses may be owned by a family member as specified under Section IX, Horse Show Rules, page 29 – Ownership or Lease, Rules 1&2, of the 2025 State Rules for California Fairs:
 - a. Any horse exhibited in the junior or youth division must be owned or leased by the junior exhibitor showing the horse or owned by the junior exhibitor's parent, stepparent, sibling, half-sibling, stepsibling, grandparent, step grandparent, sibling's spouse, half sibling's spouse, step-sibling's spouse or legal guardian (as evidenced by court documents) or owned by the institution in which the junior exhibitor is enrolled as a ward. Separate legal entities, such as family corporations, trusts, or partnerships, are also authorized owners of the youth exhibitor's horse so long as all legal and equitable owners and beneficiaries of the legal entity are individuals specifically authorized by this rule. "Owned" means, in addition to other legitimate methods of acquiring ownership, the bona fide legal ownership obtained for adequate consideration in reasonable relationship with the actual market value of the horse."
 - b. Horses entered in English, Gymkhana, Western, and showmanship classes may be leased. Leased horses are not eligible for Halter classes.
10. Each individual market animal MUST have its own individual bill of sale which clearly names the exhibitor as sole owner. No co-ownership of market animals is permitted.
11. A bill of sale or a lease (ownership papers) must contain the following information:
 - a. Name and address of BOTH the buyer/lessee and the seller/lessor.
 - b. Animal identification (description, ear tags, ear notches, tattoos etc.).
 - c. All sheep and market goats must have scrapie ID numbers on the ownership papers and the animal must have a matching scrapie ear tag intact and attached to ear.
 - d. Registered sheep and Boer goats may be identified with a registration tattoo instead of a tag, as long as, the animal is accompanied by a copy of the registration certificate listing the current owner or the registration certificate and a completed transfer of ownership form dated within 30 days that lists the current owner.
 - e. The bill of sale for all cattle privately purchased must be on California State form, commonly known as the "yellow sheet" and a brand inspection.
 - f. Small animal exhibitors may use an attestation of ownership for bill of sale purposes.
 - g. All horses must be owned or leased at least 120 consecutive days prior to the Santa Clara County Fair horse show date. Horse ownership statements or lease agreements must be signed and notarized by no later than April 2, 2025. Registration papers from a breed registry must show ownership by Exhibitor or family member for at least 120 days prior to the Santa Clara County Fair Horse Show Date (by April 2, 2025). Lease agreements and ownership statements MUST be notarized – no exceptions. Registration papers issued by breed registry need not be notarized. A scanned copy of each document (Registration Papers, Ownership Statement or Lease Agreement with Pictures or Bill of Sale showing Sale Date) must be e-mailed **NO LATER THAN April 2, 2025** to the Horse Show Manager, Regina Matthews, at regina@danandregina.com. They must also be emailed to the Exhibits office, Attn: Horse Ownership at mbeckwith@thefair.org.
 - h. Horse registration papers from a breed registry must show ownership by Exhibitor or family member for at least 120 days prior to the Santa Clara County Fair Horse Show Date (by April 2, 2025).
12. A photocopy of the original proof of ownership (bill of sale, brand inspection certificate, etc.) must be attached to the pre-tagging paperwork for all market animals. Failure to provide said proof of ownership will constitute an incomplete entry and that entry will not be processed, thereby causing the entry to be excluded from the Santa Clara County Fair. **NO EXCEPTIONS.**
13. Original ownership paperwork for cattle must be surrendered at weigh-in. All other ownership papers must be available upon request for the entire run of the Fair.

14. All breeding animal exhibitors must check in their ownership papers 24 hours prior to show.
15. All market beef entries must be owned at least 120 days prior to the first day of the Santa Clara County Fair. See important dates section for ownership date.
16. All other large market animals (i.e. market sheep, market goats and market swine) entered must be owned at least 60 days prior to the first day of the Santa Clara County Fair. See important dates section for ownership date.
 - a. Market Swine Exhibitors will have to submit **Proposition 12 required certificate from a third party** certified breeder as required by the law. Self-Certification is no longer allowed.
17. All breeding and dairy animals, market chickens, turkeys, market rabbits, entered must be owned at least 30 days prior to first day of the Santa Clara County Fair. See important dates section for ownership date.
18. Large breeding animals must provide a bill of sale or statement of ownership and small animals must provide an attestation of ownership. State Rules for California Fairs regarding breeding partnerships apply.
19. No backup animals will be allowed to show. Livestock will only be allowed to show if all pre-tagging and ownership rules are followed. **NEW!**

Pre-Fair Tagging

20. All species pre-tagging is the responsibility of the exhibitors, leaders and/or advisors. The pre-tagging process for 4-H and FFA exhibitors is to be completed by leaders/advisors. The 4-H/FFA Leader/Advisor is to completely fill out the pre-tagging request form when emailed by the Exhibits office. If you are not in 4-H or FFA and do not receive an email, contact the Santa Clara County Fair office for tagging materials and procedures. Completed pre-tagging kits must be dropped off at the fairground's front office. Refer to the important dates page for when beef and sheep/goats/swine pre-tagging kits are due. DNA and all applicable paperwork **MUST BE IN THE FAIR OFFICE BY THE DEADLINE**. Failure to have your market animal pre-tagged will prohibit your animal from being entered in the 2025 Santa Clara County Fair – **NO EXCEPTIONS WILL BE MADE**.
 - a. **Propositions 12** A bill of sale and Propositions 12 certificate must be turned for market swine at pre-tagging. Market Swine Exhibitors will have to submit Proposition 12 required certificate from a third-party certified breeder as required by the law. Self-Certification is no longer allowed. **NEW!**
 - i. Information can be found at website listed below: <https://www.cdfa.ca.gov/AHFSS/AnimalCare/>.

21. DNA samples for all market species are required to be submitted with pre-tagging. DNA samples must be submitted in the provided pre-tagging envelope with the label on the front of the envelope completely filled out. The envelope should be sealed with the exhibitor's signature across the seal.
22. Exhibitors of bred and owned market animals must own and have possession of the dam & offspring within Santa Clara County, provide permanent identification of dam & offspring and will submit a DNA sample of both the dam and their market animal when exhibitors submit their pre-tagging paperwork along with a statement of ownership or a copy of the registration papers for the Dam.
23. Independent exhibitors must also submit photos of their animal. Contact the livestock office for more information mbeckwith@thefair.org.
24. If the fair tag or scrapie tag falls out before Fair vet check/check-in, please contact the Fair Office immediately for instructions for a missing scrapie or fair tag and to obtain a new tag. Every effort should be made to attach tags securely so that they last through the Fair.

Entering and Fee Payments

25. An online entry is **REQUIRED** for all areas of competition unless the entry notes otherwise. All entries for the Santa Clara County Fair can be found online **ONLY** and must be submitted by the entry deadline as delineated for the department entered. No entries will be accepted after the late entry deadline. Please call the Santa Clara County Fair exhibits office with any questions.
26. Check department rules and guidelines for additional entry information and fees. A synopsis of important dates may be found on the Livestock Show Schedule.
27. All fee payments will be online at checkout during the online entry process. We accept Visa, MasterCard or Discover for fee payments. Late entries require an additional \$10.00 late fee per class at checkout.
28. Online entries must be completely filled out with all information necessary to determine that the entry and exhibitor are eligible for the classes entered. Exhibitor's, Parent's, and Leader's signatures on the Exhibitor Code of Conduct and Entry Memo of Understanding form confirms their acceptance of all rules and regulations of the Santa Clara County Fair and the Exhibitor Memorandum of Understanding and Code of Conduct as shown in the Santa Clara County Fair book.

Rules and Guidelines

29. A fully signed Memorandum of Understanding and Code of Conduct by the exhibitor, parent, and project leader/advisor must be uploaded to the entry site to complete all entries by the entry deadline as shown in the Santa Clara County Fair book. Until this is received the entry will not be considered complete and the entry will not be processed. NO EXCEPTIONS.
30. All entries must be verified and approved by 4-H project leaders or FFA advisors. A list of their club/chapter entries will be provided to those leaders/advisors for verification.
31. All junior animal exhibitors must also submit a Competitive Exhibit entry. Failure to enter a Junior Competitive Exhibit entry will result in ineligibility to show animal(s), receive any premium monies, and participate in auction. Competitive Exhibit entries MAY NOT be purchased, they must be made/baked/created by the exhibitor. If it's found that an exhibit was previously entered and judged or made by anyone other than the exhibitor, it will be disqualified, and the exhibitor will not be able to enter another exhibit in its place. Failure to enter a competitive exhibit will result in inability to show any animal(s) and receive any premium monies. – they must follow Competitive Exhibits guidelines.
32. A complete entry consists of the following:
 - a. Fully completed online entries.
 - b. Entry fees paid in full.
 - c. Fully signed Memorandum of Understanding and Code of Conduct uploaded to entry system.
 - d. YQCA Ethics Course Certificate of Completion number on all animal online entries.
 - e. Market Animals Exhibitors must complete and upload a drug statement.
 - f. Project Leader/Advisor approval.
 - g. Any and all required pre-tagging, DNA and/or check-in paperwork as per species requirements.
 - h. Entry of a Competitive Exhibit. See the Competitive Exhibits Entry Book for more details.
33. All RV payments must be made online.

YQCA Yearly Online Ethics Course

34. In compliance with the rules for California Fairs, proof of completion of the annual one-hour Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) Online Ethics course will be required of all animal exhibitors ages 9 to 19 prior to entering the 2025 Santa Clara County Fair. Once the Exhibitor completes the course with a passing score, a completion certificate with a corresponding certificate number will be issued. For assistance with entries for exhibitors under 8 years of age, please contact the fair office for instructions. This number will be required on your online entry. Certificate numbers will be checked for validity. Entries with invalid certificate numbers or without a certificate number are incomplete and will not be processed until a valid certificate number is received. Certificate numbers must be received no later than the entry deadline to be valid.

How to register for the YQCA Ethics Course

35. To register go to: <https://yqcaprogram.org/> and create an account.
 - a. A separate account is required for each Exhibitor. Siblings cannot take the course together as each will need an individual certificate number for their Fair Entry. The course is \$12 per exhibitor.
 - b. Clubs/projects may fundraise to cover the costs, as YQCA does offer coupon codes which are one-time use codes that cover the registration costs. More information on the coupon codes can be found here: [YQCA: Buy Coupons](#).

Weigh-In and Vet Check

36. All trailers or vehicles arriving on the Santa Clara Fairgrounds may be inspected at Management's discretion. Any trailer hauling sheep & goats MUST go through the vet check BEFORE proceeding to the barns. Failure to do so may result in disqualification. Any exhibitor refusing to have their animal examined shall be disqualified without refund and such violation will be reported to the State Fairs and Exhibition Department.
37. On receiving day for their animal species, exhibitors will enter the fairgrounds and proceed to the designated Vet Check location. Animals should remain in the trailer until otherwise instructed and the vet has inspected and cleared them. Once cleared, animals may be taken into their designated areas.
38. There shall be no feeding, tagging, or clipping/shearing of animal once in the vet check or weigh-in lines.
39. All livestock entries shall have only Santa Clara County Fair and/or scrapie tags attached. Any other tag will be removed at the scale, unless it is tagged for a future show.
40. All sheep and goats must pass a vet check upon arrival at the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds before they are allowed into the barns and their assigned pens.
 - a. To pass the vet check, all sheep and goats must have a scrapie tag attached and intact in their ear.

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- b. Dairy goats, pygmy goats and breeding Boer goats are allowed a readable ear tattoo or microchip for scrapie (tail tattoo for Lamancha) in lieu of a tag. This includes nursing kids.
- c. No tattooing or blunting is to be done on Santa Clara County Fairgrounds property.
- d. The ownership papers or in the case of dairy goats a stamped duplicate from ADGA must reference the animal's registration number.
- e. This vet check process is a federally mandated requirement; no exceptions will be allowed. The decision of the appointed veterinarian and/or approved Santa Clara County Fair designee on the health of the animal is final without recourse through appeal.
- 41. Exhibitors showing market and/or feeder animals shall be solely responsible for having their animals weighed at the Santa Clara County Fair. Only one (1) official and final weigh-in is allowed, and only one (1) re-weigh will be allowed if requested. Any question of weight must be resolved while the animal is on the scale. All market animal classes are to be determined after weigh-in, as classes will be determined by weight ONLY.
- 42. If exhibitor elects to re-weigh their animal, the following procedure MUST be followed:
 - a. Exhibitors must request a re-weigh while animal is still on the scale for original weigh-in.
 - b. Remove the animal so scale may be re-balanced.
 - c. Re-weigh the animal.
 - d. The re-weigh will be the final weight recorded by the weighmaster whether it is more or less than the original weigh-in weight.

Attire Standards

- 43. The full uniform of the Exhibitor's organization must be worn in all show rings and auction arena.
- 44. All exhibitors shall abide by the uniform requirements of their respective organizations while showing their animals.
 - a. If an exhibitor is helping another youth show in an organization other than their own (ex. A 4-H youth helping a FFA youth) they should wear the Independent uniform with no organization affiliated attire.
 - b. **FFA** - The official FFA show uniform is:
 - i. Boys - White pants ONLY, white shirt, FFA tie, Official FFA jacket zipped to the top.
 - ii. Girls - White pants ONLY, white blouse, FFA scarf, Official FFA jacket zipped to the top.
 - iii. Closed toe shoes or boots, which must fit under your pant legs.
 - c. **4-H** - The official 4-H show uniform is:
 - i. Official 4-H hat branded with the University of California, Agriculture and Natural Resources (UC ANR) and the 4-H clover logo mark, worn on the head. (4-H Hats purchased previous to the new UC ANR logo are still acceptable.)
 - ii. A traditional 4-H tie or scarf, with 4-H emblem, worn with the collared white shirt.
 - iii. A plain white shirt with a collar and sleeves. Any length of sleeve is acceptable. It is required that Poultry, Cavy and Rabbit exhibitors wear long sleeve white shirts when carrying and showing their animals.
 - iv. White pants ONLY for livestock exhibitors. EXCEPTION Horse exhibitors may wear black or dark blue jeans or white, black, or beige English Breeches for English Classes.
 - v. Girls may substitute a white blouse and skirt for a white dress with 4-H collar for items iii and iv. No tank tops or halters allowed.
 - vi. Closed toe shoes or boots, which must fit under your pant legs.
 - vii. Primary members may wear 4-H hat and 4-H tie or scarf.
 - d. **Grange** - The Official Grange show uniform is:
 - i. Dark blue denim pants, white button-front dress shirt with collar; the official red vest with National Grange emblem on the back (this must be purchased through the California State Grange office, no homemade vests will be allowed); black or brown belt with appropriate buckle; and closed toe shoes or boots.
 - ii. Hats and headgear of any kind are not to be worn while showing.
 - e. **Independent** - The Official Independent show uniform is
 - i. White pants ONLY, white shirt or blouse EXCLUDING any insignia.
 - ii. Closed toe shoes or boots, which must fit under your pant legs.

2025 Judging and Awards

- 45. Classes of four (4) entries or fewer entries may be combined for meaningful competition at the discretion of the Santa Clara County Fair Management.
- 46. Auction, add-on, and/or premium checks will be made payable to the exhibitor as indicated on the online entry form. Checks are void after six (6) months from the date of distribution and WILL NOT be reissued. NEW!
- 47. Any checks that are requested to be replaced or reissued within the six months from the date of distribution are

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subject to a thirty-five-dollar (\$35.00) fee payable to the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds Management Corporation.

48. Payment of "special" premiums and awards offered in this book by any merchant or breeders association are not guaranteed by The Santa Clara County Fair. The aforementioned prizes are secured by Santa Clara County Fair Management with a promissory statement in good faith from said merchants or associations and must be contested as such with those organizations.

Safety

49. Any person who does not comply with these rules, guidelines and/or instructions may be removed from the Santa Clara County Fair.
50. Running in the barns is prohibited.
51. Except for service animals or show entries on a leash, dogs are prohibited on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds proper. Dogs staying in the RV area MUST be confined to that area ONLY. DOGS ARE STRICTLY PROHIBITED IN ANIMAL AREAS.
52. Santa Clara County Fair Management Corporation, the County of Santa Clara or their agents will use every precaution for the safe preservation of all articles and stock on exhibition, however they are not liable for any loss or damage to said items, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage.
53. Wheelchairs, or other necessary mobility assist devices, golf carts and mules operated by Santa Clara County Fair Management designees are permitted on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds. Bikes, skateboards, scooters, hover boards etc. (powered or otherwise) are prohibited on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds.
54. For the safety and health benefit of all, the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds is a smoke-free environment. Smoking is prohibited at all times on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds. This includes smoking of any and all materials, including but not limited to tobacco, non-tobacco substances, vape pens or electronic cigarettes. Those who do not comply after being asked to stop smoking will be required to leave the premises and may be denied re-entry for the run of Fair.
55. All animals (except horses and dogs) entered in the Santa Clara County Fair must be kept on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds in their designated species area and are to remain in their designated Livestock area until their release times. Large animals are not permitted in the RV area at any time. An approved release form must be presented to the designated supervisor in order to remove an animal from the premises.
56. All animals are to be properly secured and attended to at all times while they are not in their stalls/pens, including but not limited to in the wash racks, blocking chutes and fitting stands, and/or on the way to and from those locations. Exhibitors whose animals are left unattended outside of designated pen are subject to disciplinary actions.

General Information and Responsibilities

57. Showmanship must be pre-entered separately from market and non-market classes on the online entry system. No post entries (after published entry deadlines have passed) will be accepted on the Showgrounds once animals are received. **NEW!**
58. By entering an animal at the Santa Clara County Fair, exhibitors are obliged to assist Santa Clara County Fair staff if management asks to use your animal for either Small Animal Master Showmanship, or Large Animal Master Showmanship, or other classes as requested.
59. A Livestock entry may only ever be entered as a market animal one time at the Santa Clara County Fair.
60. A Pre-Fair Informational Meeting is offered to all exhibitors on Thursday, July 10, 2025 at 6:30 at the fairgrounds. All are encouraged to attend to get the latest fair updates.
61. A morning meeting will be held each day of fair starting at 8am. This meeting will go over the schedule for the day, and any other important topics or concerns. All exhibitors are expected to attend.
62. We will be hosting quarterly Zoom Leader/Advisor, Exhibitor/Parent meetings to go over new rules, and topics of confusion, dates and times for these meetings to be determined.
63. All animal exhibitors are solely responsible for the care, bathing, clipping, fitting, and feeding of their animal(s) during the entirety of their stay on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds. All pens/cages used by the exhibitor's animal(s) must be fully cleaned by 9:00am daily. Any exhibitor not in compliance with this rule may be denied premiums or auction money and may be denied return to future Santa Clara County Fairs. Santa Clara County Fair Management and staff members are not responsible for the care and supervision of said animals.
64. All signage or business cards to be placed on any exhibit, other than club signs or stall cards on stalls/pens, must be approved by Santa Clara County Fair Management or they will be removed.

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65. In compliance with the State Rules for California Fairs, any animal that shows any evidence of active, communicable disease or any other unsightly disease or other condition, or from a premise under quarantine for disease shall NOT be admitted to or remain on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds. Santa Clara County Fair Management reserves the right to require health inspections and/or diagnostic tests before, during, and after animals arrive on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds and to implement disease control procedures as they solely may deem necessary. The veterinarian (and/or approved Santa Clara County Fair Staff Member) designated by the Santa Clara County Fair will have the final word on the health of all animals entered. This includes but is not limited to, determining whether an animal or animal(s) traveling in the same trailer can be admitted to the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds. The health determination made by the Fair's designated veterinarian or approved Santa Clara County Fair staff designee is final without recourse through protest. Any Exhibitor refusing to have their animal examined shall be disqualified without refund and such violation will be reported to the State Fairs and Exhibition Department.
66. Reasonable accommodations for ADA exhibiting youth will be made on a case-by-case basis. Please contact the Livestock Office **PRIOR** to the start of the fair for more information.

Conduct

67. All exhibitors, their immediate families, and agents thereof are required to follow the rules of the Santa Clara County Fair as delineated herein. Further, they are required to cooperate with fair officials, staff and security personnel in all matters of policy including, but not limited to parking, stall/pen/space assignments, class procedures, judging and good animal welfare practices as determined by the Santa Clara County Fair Management or designees. Any exhibitors, their families and/or agents who do not comply with cooperation as delineated above are subject to censure as determined by Management. Censure measures may include disqualification, forfeiture of awards, premiums or sales proceeds, removal from the Fairgrounds or participation in future Fairs.

Small Animal Responsibilities and Expectations

68. Small Animal Exhibitors must enter the fairgrounds on the receiving and/or judging day indicated under species rules, unload in the designated area, and then proceed to the check-in/judging area.
69. The Santa Clara County Fair requires all exhibitors with small animals to leave their animals at the Santa Clara County Fair from their show day until the release time at the end of the fair unless otherwise noted.
70. Pygmy goats are required to go through a vet check and poultry to go through a health inspection upon arrival and before penning.
71. Owners are responsible for ensuring that their animals' cages are securely fastened. Animal owners will supervise the securing of cages and will provide pliers and hog ring crimpers or cable (zip) ties.
72. It is the responsibility of all rabbit and cavy exhibitors to ensure that their animals arrive at the judging tables on time.
73. All animals must be identified by appropriate/approved method (i.e., tattoos, leg bands) prior to arrival at the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds. The Fair does not supply those items.
 - a. Rabbits – ear tattoo ****Note that any duplication of ear markings by exhibitors in the same class must be eliminated per ARBA regulations.****
 - b. Cavies – ear tag.
 - c. Pygmy Goats – tattoo or microchip. Exhibitors are responsible for providing microchip readers at vet check and the show. The Santa Clara County Fair does not supply microchip readers.
 - d. Poultry - identified by commercially purchased numbered leg bands.
74. A judge may excuse any animal from competition if it appears fatigued or out of condition.
75. A judge may excuse a rabbit from competition because of a temporary curable disease or parasite.
76. The exhibitor is responsible for the proper checkout of small animals: pygmy goats, cavies, poultry, or rabbits.
77. All exhibitors are responsible for processing and delivery to the buyer of their small market animals sold through the Santa Clara County Fair Junior Livestock Auction. The seller must process and deliver small market animals within two weeks of the sale date.

Rules and Guidelines

During the Fair

78. In compliance with the USDA Wholesome Meat Act reporting requirements, all exhibitors and/or their leaders/advisors are required to report the administration of ANY SUBSTANCE (including, but not limited to, herbs, "calming" substances, aspirin, and over-the-counter medications) by the veterinarian, owner, or individual to the Livestock Office PRIOR to the administration of said substance(s). This ensures the market animal is given substances that will be acceptable to the processor.
79. Exhibitors will be responsible for spot cleaning and ensuring there is adequate bedding in their pens daily. At their discretion, Santa Clara County Fair Management or designee reserves the right to require exhibitor(s) to clean their pens or add bedding on any day.
80. All grooming, washing, clipping, and feeding of animals to be shown by a junior exhibitor MUST be done by the junior exhibitor. No professional, non-exhibitor, or adult help is permitted. EXCEPTION: For safety purposes, a Leader/Advisor may assist in holding/controlling the animal while the junior exhibitor works, if necessary.
81. The use of any substances to alter the physical appearance of an animal entered in livestock events including, but not limited to, dyes, colored products on legs or body, hair builders, and using banned fitting products on any part of the animal is prohibited. Adhesive may be used on the legs and tail heads and paint may be used no other places than horns or hooves, Santa Clara County Fair Management or designees may approach an exhibitor if a violation of this Rule is reported. Repeated instances of violation of this rule may cause exhibitor to be subject the disciplinary action of Fair Management as per rule #14 of the Code of Conduct.
82. All beef cattle and dairy cattle must have a neck rope and a rope halter on at all times while in their stalls.
83. No collars, halters, costumes, décor, or props may be left on sheep or goats while in the barn. **NEW!**
84. No junior exhibitor will be allowed to sleep in a pen with their animals.
85. Shavings are required as bedding for all large animals except for Dairy Cattle and Dairy Goats, which may be bedded on straw. Exhibitors are responsible for providing their own bedding. The Santa Clara County Fairgrounds does NOT provide bedding of any kind.
86. Pelleted bedding will now be required for all beef cattle. No flaked shavings will be used. Two mats per animal will also be required for beef exhibitors, to help prevent cattle stiffness and ensure the safety of all exhibitors animals.
87. No pictures are to be taken by parents/ chaperones in the arena immediately after any class. A 5-minute opportunity to take pictures will be provided at the conclusion of each Champion Drive.

Parking and Entrance Passes

88. All individuals attending the annual county fair must pay for admission and parking.
89. All exhibitors will be required to purchase tickets and parking for each day they attend the Santa Clara County Fair. Tickets will be available through the online entry system. The final day to purchase Admission Tickets and Parking Passes at a discounted rate online is Wednesday, July 3, 2025 by 11:59PM. After this time, the cost will have a late fee applied.
 - Run of Fair General Admission (Ages 5 and under): Free
 - Run of Fair General Admission (Ages 6 and up): \$60
 - Run of Fair Parking: \$50
 - Carnival: Exhibitors will have free access to the carnival on Wednesday. Should exhibitors want to purchase run of fair carnival admission passes for Thursday-Sunday it is \$80.

Tack Space

90. Tack space will be VERY limited. Because of this we are requesting that ONLY necessary tack is brought on the grounds. If space becomes an issue Fair Management may request that some tack items be removed.
91. Generators are not allowed in the Livestock area/barn.

Clean Stalls

92. At least once each day, a volunteer will walk through and judge the livestock areas and inspect pens, tack areas, and the livestock surrounding areas. They will be looking for cleanliness and the general appearance of assigned pen areas for each club, chapter, or group. If necessary, they will ask exhibitors to clean pens, add bedding, sweep areas, or perform needed tasks to ensure areas are clean and safe for animals, exhibitors, and the public alike. **NEW!**
93. All pens, including tack areas, must be cleaned by 9:00 AM daily.
94. It will be required to strip pens twice throughout the week, once on Tuesday, July 29 and once on Friday, August 1. All

pens will need to be fully stripped of any bedding and checked off by fair management, before bedding is added back.

95. Inspections may take place any time between 9:00 AM and 5:00 PM daily and by noon on Saturday.
96. Inspections will be done daily including show days.
97. Each club or chapter should have an Educational Display at their pens for each species. Rabbits, Cavies and Poultry should have a display table set up nearby with their educational information.
98. Each pen is required to have a stall card or coop card for each animal with: Exhibitors Name, Club/ Chapter/ etc., Animals Name, Ear Tag Number, and Breed info.
99. Exhibitors are responsible for cleaning the front aisle and all around their pens and are responsible for keeping tack areas and aisles clean and neat.
100. Communal walkways/areas should be cleaned by all. If your animal makes a mess, you are responsible for cleaning up after them.
101. It is suggested there be a member on pen duty during the operating hours of the fair, while the barns are open to the public.
102. Animals are expected to be kept clean and free of manure.
103. Sheep, goats, pigs, and all small animals are expected to have clean water available to them at all times.
104. The cattle drinking area is expected to remain neat and clear of manure.
105. Failure of exhibitors to correct any requested tasks may result in the loss of all points for the day or further action as described in the Code of Conduct and Rules and Guidelines in the front of this book at the discretion of Fair Management.
106. Herdsmanship judging will use the following criteria, using a scale of 1-5, with **1 poor, 3 good, and 5 excellent**, the areas for consideration will include:
 - a. **Clean Pens**
 - i. Stalls and pens must be cleaned before 9:00 AM daily and maintained throughout the day.
 - ii. Manure and soiled bedding are to be removed from stalls/pens and deposited in the proper place.
 - iii. Appropriate amount of bedding.
 - b. **Clean Aisle**
 - i. Alleys should be swept clean and free of debris, bedding, and manure.
 - c. **Stall Cards and Signs**
 - i. 4-H/FFA exhibitor stall cards/coop cards and club/chapter signs are displayed and easy to identify.
 - ii. Club/Chapter signs in place clearly identifying pens or stall areas.
 - iii. Stall cards attached over stalls and pens, and properly filled out.
 - iv. Supreme and Reserve Supreme Champion signs displayed over champion stalls and pens.
 - d. **Animal Cleanliness**
 - i. Animals are adequately cared for with proper feed, proper amount of bedding, available clean water for hogs, sheep, goats, and small animals, and adequate feeding equipment.
 - e. **Decorations**
 - i. Decorations and other added accessories to make the area attractive.
 - f. **Tack/Tack Pens/Equipment**
 - i. Equipment, grooming, alley, and feed area are clean and neatly arranged.
 - ii. Cords and grooming equipment are not cluttering the alley.
 - iii. Forks, brooms, show boxes, feed, and watering equipment are neatly stored when not in use.
 - g. **Overall Impression**
 - i. The impression of the display of the club/chapter's exhibit space.
 - ii. Value of information in the educational display.
 - h. **Educational Component**
 - i. Rabbits, chickens, and cavies should have a table display set up nearby with their educational information.
 - ii. All other livestock should have an educational component as part of their display to help educate the public.
 - i. **Bonus Point Opportunities**
 - i. Exhibitor on pen duty
 - ii. Wetting the Arena
 - iii. Clean communal areas (walkways, washrack, arena, cattle chute/ sheep or goat stand areas)
 - iv. Auction set up/ tear down
 - v. Use of Animals for Livestock Judging and Master Showmanship
 - vi. Participation in other events like Skill-a-ton, Fitting Contest, etc.

Rules and Guidelines

Animal Release

107. ALL EXHIBITS (animals, products, or articles on exhibition) may NOT be removed from the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds prior to the release time published/announced herein. All exhibits of any kind must remain intact until the said release time.
108. Junior large and small animals released times are noted herein in the Livestock Show Schedule section. A written release is required for removal of all livestock. Releases will be issued by designated Fair Staff after thorough cleaning of pens/stalls is complete.
109. Removal of any livestock, decoration, or bedding prior to designated release time, (unless previously arranged with Fair Management) will result in censure, including remedies as delineated in Rule #14 of the Code of Conduct/ General Procedural Rules and Rule #64 of the Rules and Guidelines.
110. The Santa Clara County Fairgrounds is not responsible for any animals, tack or exhibits left on the Fairgrounds after 11:59PM on Monday, August 4, 2025.

Pee Wee Showmanship

111. There will be ONLY two age divisions:
 - a. 5 years old to 7 years old
 - b. 8 years old to showing age
 - c. Youth under the age of 5 may not participate in Pee Wee Showmanship.
112. All participants must sign up at the livestock office and complete a liability waiver form before participating. No sign ups at ring side.
113. No awards other than participation ribbons will be awarded if there are not a minimum of 5 youth participating in each class.
114. Due to the fun nature of the class, as well as the youth participating, awards will be distributed fairly based on performance, but will also be distributed proportionately to all participating youth.
115. Pee Wee exhibitors may have older youth or adults help them to control their animals. But the Pee Wee exhibitor should be the primary handler of the animal.

Over the Hill Showmanship

116. There will be divisions for Over the Hill Showmanship:
 - a. Silly – you and your “animal” may have a costume and props. They must be family friendly in nature. There will be no riding of any animal.
 - b. Serious – will be showing as if you were a youth exhibitor in a showmanship class, except no uniform is required but highly recommended.
117. All participants must sign up at the livestock office and complete a liability waiver form before participating. No sign ups at ring side.
118. No awards other than participation ribbons will be awarded if there are not a minimum of 5 adults participating in each class.

Junior Livestock Auction Rules

1. **AUCTION DEADLINE:** Deadline for submitting auction paperwork is by 10am Friday, August 1st. All Exhibitors are solely responsible for bringing the correct paperwork to the Livestock Office by the stated deadline. No scratches or substitutions will be allowed after the stated closing date/time. **Once the auction list is posted, the exhibitor is SOLELY responsible for reporting any discrepancies in the auction information for their entry within two (2) hours of said posting. ABSOLUTELY NO CHANGES WILL BE MADE TO THE AUCTION LIST AFTER THAT TIME OR ON THE DAY OF THE AUCTION.**
2. Participation in the Santa Clara County Fair Livestock Open-Bid Auction is open to market animals owned and exhibited by Santa Clara County resident exhibitors who are members in good standing of 4-H or FFA ONLY, which were judged in the current Santa Clara County Fair market classes as market ready/acceptable.
3. Exhibitors may only sell one (1) market animal through the auction, regardless of affiliation or lack of affiliation with an association. For exceptions see below.
 - a. All Champion and Reserve Champion animals must be sold through the open bid process.
 - b. In County exhibitors with Champion and/or Reserve Champion animals will be allowed to auction one (1) additional animal or meat pen, for each Champion and/or Reserve Champion lot, per exhibitor.
 - c. Out of County, Independent, and Grange exhibitors are subject to all guidelines referencing the sale of their market animals.
 - d. The Heritage Hog will not count toward the exhibitor's limit of one (1) auction entry.
4. Excluding Champion and Reserve Champion exhibitors, which are subject to the open-bid process, Santa Cruz, San Benito, Alameda, San Mateo, and Monterey County, Grange and Independent exhibitors may sell one (1) animal through the Santa Clara County Fair if:
 - a. They have a prearranged buyer.
 - b. The exhibitor provides the Santa Clara County Fair with a certified check for the designated animal and fills out the appropriate paperwork prior to the auction deadline of Friday, August 1, 2025, by 10AM.
 - c. The sale price of the animal is at least the current market price.
 - d. The purchase price includes the processing fee and any other charges normally associated with the sale.
 - e. The exhibitor will not participate in the live auction. Animals will just be added to the truck for processing.
 - f. The exhibitor will also be subject to the same 5% service fee/sales commission and check off fees charged to all exhibitors that sell an animal.
 - g. All other junior auction rules still apply.
 - h. There will not be an independent or grange champion awarded in any market class, unless there are a minimum of five (5) animals in the specie being owned by a minimum of three (3) different exhibitors.
 - i. If a Champion Independent or Grange entry is awarded, the Independent or Grange exhibitors may sell more than one (1) animal through auction, if there were more than ten (10) animals in the species' respective Independent or Grange market class.
 - j. In the event an Out of County is awarded a champion they may sell a second animal, as long as the exhibitor complies with the aforementioned and has a prearranged buyer and certified check as stated.
5. **ALL EXHIBITORS SELLING ANIMALS THROUGH THE AUCTION WILL BE REQUIRED TO VERIFY THAT THEIR ANIMAL IS FREE OF DRUG RESIDUE BY SIGNING A DECLARATION FORM FOR THE ANIMAL ENTERED INTO THE AUCTION.** Drug withdrawal times for all medications given to all market animals must be strictly adhered to. Any animal that tests positive for any medication at the time of harvest will be held at the harvesting facility until resolution and disposition. **THE EXHIBITOR IS RESPONSIBLE FOR ALL COSTS INCURRED.**
6. Santa Clara County Junior Livestock Auction is a Terminal Sale. All animals entered into the auction will be sold for processing. There will be no live animal sales at the auction. Small animal processing and delivery is the responsibility of the seller. The seller must process and deliver the market animals within two weeks of the sale date.
7. **EXHIBITORS ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR GETTING THE ANIMALS INTO THE SALE RING AND TO THE HOLDING AREA ON TIME, AND FOR RETURNING ANIMALS TO THEIR PEN AFTER SALE.** All exhibitors/members selling animals are required to be in the official uniform of their organization at the time their animal is sold, and animals must appear in the sale order as listed and at the proper time or they will be sold at the current resale price.

Junior Livestock Auction Rules

8. Sale animals may not be altered from standard fitting and showing condition, including but not limited to paint, dye or glitter. Champion and Reserve Champion banners are considered acceptable if pre-approved by Santa Clara County Fair Management.
9. OWNERS/EXHIBITORS ARE REQUIRED TO BE PRESENT AT THE AUCTION TO SELL THEIR ANIMAL. IF THE EXHIBITOR CANNOT BE PRESENT, THEY MUST HAVE PRIOR APPROVAL FROM THE FAIR MANAGER. NO ACCEPTATIONS!! It is the exhibitor's responsibility to locate a substitute to take their animal through auction and get fair staff approval prior to the start of the auction. If the exhibitor has filled out an auction form the animal(s) must be sold.
10. **Jumbo Weight Market Animals:** Animals exceeding top market weights will be allowed to show and sell if meeting standards. Jumbo weight animals will sell at the top weight limitation and the buyer will not pay for the excess over that top market weight.
11. If the harvesting facility condemns a carcass, it is SCCFMC's responsibility to contact the buyer to see if a replacement carcass can be substituted. If not, it is SCCFMC's responsibility to refund the buyer's money and the exhibitor will forfeit any proceeds from the sale of the animals.
12. A 5% service fee/sales commission and check off fees will be charged on all animals sold. Funds derived are used for bookkeeping, auction brochures, auction supplies, equipment, auctioneer and other such costs.
13. Auction, add-on, and/or premium checks will be made payable to the exhibitor as indicated on the online entry system. Checks are void after six (6) months from the date of distribution and WILL NOT be reissued.
14. Any checks that are requested to be replaced or reissued within the six months from the date of distribution are subject to a thirty-five-dollar (\$35.00) fee payable to the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds Management Corporation.
15. Exhibitor's social security number must be on file prior to issuing any checks. **NEW!**
16. No awards, speeches, or decorations except those approved by Santa Clara County Fair Management will be given during the auction or in the auction ring.
17. **Order of Sale:** Eggs, Market Chickens, Turkeys, Rabbits, Hogs, Beef, Lambs, and Goats. Champions to be sold at the beginning of their respective species. Order is subject to change and fair staff will notify buyers as best they can if any changes occur.
18. Only market animals judged as market ready or market acceptable are eligible for auction.
19. The sale will begin at 10:00AM on Saturday, August 2, 2025. All animals are sold to the highest bidder. Animals will be sold individually and are sold by the pound, except for meat pen rabbits sold per lot of three (3) rabbits, meat pen chickens sold per lot of two (2) chickens and eggs sold by lot of one (1) dozen eggs.
20. **Sale Management:** Sale Management herein referred to pertains to Santa Clara County Fair Junior Livestock Auction Team. The information contained in any catalog and any subsequent publication was provided to the Sale Management. All activities performed by the Sale Management have been done as a service. Sale Management assumes no responsibility or liability for the accuracy of information contained herein or for any reference or warranties, whether written or oral, express, or implied.
21. **Buyer's Risk:** Seller retains all risk of loss to an animal prior to its being declared sold by the auctioneer. Sale Management assumes all risk of loss until such time as the animal is released to the Buyer(s) or carcass is delivered to cold storage plant.
22. The Auctioneer will settle any dispute or challenge regarding bidding and their decision will be final. The Auctioneer has the right to refuse bids from anyone who has a previous record of default in payment or who has declined to make proper registration and/or credit clearance with the auction management. If a buyer(s) has not paid for a prior auction obligation, the buyer(s) will not be allowed to register.
23. Any and all disputes brought forth during the live auction should be immediately brought back to the block for clarification. Any and all disputes brought forth after the completion of the auction shall be brought to the Fair Manager and Team Leaders for clarification and their decision will be final. completion of a thank you card for each animal auctioned and any add-ons prior to receiving their auction checks. Exhibitors may bring **NEW!**
24. **New Buyers:** Any buyer who did not register or purchase an animal during the 2024 junior livestock auctions will be considered a new buyer. New buyers will need to pay in full before the end of the auction.
25. **Thank you cards:** All exhibitors placing an animal through auction must show proof of their thank you card(s) or a copy of their thank you cards to livestock office to be checked off, if adding one to a buyers basket, or after the completion of the auction for verification one was written. All thank you cards, including auction, add-on, and all livestock or home arts awards letters are to be written within a week of the closing of add ons! Failure to write thank yours will cause delays, up to the the forfeiting of your auction checks. **NEW!**

Junior Livestock Auction Rules

26. **Buyers Coalition:** The Santa Clara County Fair is proud to announce that we will be continuing the Buyer's Coalition again this year! The Buyer's Coalition allows for donations to be collected from local businesses and community members. Those donations will be used to buy livestock from the Santa Clara County Youth Livestock Auction. The meat that is bought at the auction will then be donated to local food banks and soup kitchens.

In order for your animal to be purchased by the Buyers Coalition and to receive Add-Ons from them exhibitors must:

- a. Only open to exhibitors living in Santa Clara County
- b. Complete the application process that includes the following:
 - i. Basic Information (Name, Age, Club/Chapter, Years in the program)
 - ii. Short-Essay Questions
 - iii. A MAILED (not emailed) buyer's letter to the Buyers Coalition
- c. Other Notes:
 - i. Filling out the application does not guarantee a bid from the Buyers Coalition
 - ii. "Floor prices" will not be established or marketed before the sale.
 - iii. Only available to youth who go through the auction.
 - iv. Only available for large animals (beef, sheep, swine, goats)
 - v. Leaders MUST verify other five (5) buyers letters had been sent
 - vi. Money may be used for add-ons

Special Contests

Throughout fair week, we will have different fun activities for exhibitors and youth to participate in. You can see the list of activities below, and if you would like more information, some of the contests will have its rules and guidelines listed in the book.

1. Cattle Fitting Contest
 - a. The Cattle Fitting Contest gives youth a chance to showcase their fitting skills, and their process for getting a calf ready for showday.
 - b. See Beef section, page 84 for more details.
2. Dairy Goat Fitting Contest
 - a. The Dairy Goat Fitting Contest gives youth a chance to showcase their fitting skills, and their process for getting a goat ready for showday.
 - b. See Dairy Goat section, page 92 for more details.
3. Large Animal Skill-a-thon
 - a. The Large Animal Skill-a-thon is a contest in which youth go around to different “stations”: These stations consist of activities such as hands on activities, quizzes, product/ tool identification, and more.
4. Small Animal Skill-a-thon
 - a. The Small Animal Skill-a-thon is a contest to in which youth can test their all around knowledge of small animals.
5. Livestock Judging Contest
 - a. Participants will judge a class of beef cattle, sheep, swine, and market goats. Participants evaluate an animal's physical traits and compare them to other animals. This contest is a great way to practice and learn how to evaluate livestock.
6. Dairy Goat Milking Contest
 - a. The Dairy Goat Milking Contest measures the volume of milk produced by each goat entered in a 24 hour period. This contest was designed to simulate an official milk test and encourage youth to sign their herds up for testing.

7. Barnyard Olympics
 - a. This will be a fun collection of games for exhibitors to participate in throughout the week of fair. At the end of the week, scores will be tallied for the “Olympics” winner.

Small Animal Showmanship Rules & Guidelines:

1. American system of judging.
2. At this time, we do not offer showmanship classes for Independent and Grange exhibitors.
3. All showmanship classes must be pre-entered separately on the online entry system. NO DAY OF SHOW ENTRIES!
4. Only animals owned, fitted, and shown by the exhibitor in Junior Small Animal Department regular classes, are allowed to be shown in showmanship.
5. Animals removed from their exhibit cages or pens must be returned immediately following the completion of showmanship.
6. Please NOTE that for ALL classes, once you enter the arena for the next level of Showmanship, in a particular species, you now compete at that level until you advance again. You MAY NOT go back down a level (in that specie) at ANY future Santa Clara County Fair.
7. Showmanship first place winners are not required to show in the next level of showmanship the year they win, but they will be required to move up to the next level in the following year.
8. Showmanship classes will be broken into groups as follows:
 - a. **4-H Primary (Clover) Showmanship** – Exhibitors who are 5 years on January 1st of current year to 8 years of age on December 31st of previous year.
 - b. **4-H Beginning Showmanship** – Exhibitors who are 9 to 13 years of age as of January 1st of the current year, who have never won a first-place ribbon in Showmanship in that species category at the Santa Clara County Fair. First, second, and third place ribbon winners may enter Novice Showmanship this year.
 - c. **4-H Novice Showmanship** – Exhibitors who are 14 years of age and older as of January 1st of current year, and exhibitors 13 years of age and younger who have won a first place ribbon in Beginning Showmanship or have previously advanced to Novice Showmanship at the Santa Clara County. First, second, and third place ribbon winners may enter Advanced Showmanship this year.
 - d. **4-H Advanced Showmanship** – Exhibitors of any age, who have won a first-place ribbon in Novice Showmanship of this species in prior years at the Santa Clara County Fair. Additionally, any exhibitor who has exhibited in prior years at the Santa Clara County Fair at the Advanced level must show in the Advanced Showmanship group. The first-place winner of the Advanced Showmanship class is eligible to compete in Small Animal Master Showmanship, unless they have already won Small Animal Master Showmanship twice previously.
 - e. **FFA Novice Showmanship** – Exhibitors who are showing this species for the first year ever, who have NEVER shown this species previously in this or any other organization, show, or fair, excluding jackpot shows. The project should start no sooner than September 1st of the preceding year. The place winners of first, second, and third, may enter Advanced Showmanship this year.
 - f. **FFA Advanced Showmanship**: Exhibitors who have shown this specie in this organization or any other organization at Santa Clara County Fair, excluding jackpot shows, must show in Advanced FFA Showmanship. The project should start no sooner than September 1st of the preceding year. The first place winner of Advanced FFA Showmanship classes are eligible for Small Animal Master Showmanship unless they have already won Small Animal Master Showmanship twice previously.

Small Animal Master Showmanship Rules

Judging	Sunday, August 3 rd @ 2PM in the main show arena
Entry Fee	No pre-entry. Entrants based on showmanship placing.

Contestants must check in at the Small Animal Arena a minimum of 30 minutes prior to the start of the contest.

Small Animal Master Showmanship (Previously Round Robin) Rules & Guidelines:

1. An individual can win Small Animal Master Showmanship only twice, and thereafter, is not eligible to participate in the contest again after a second win.
2. Only Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, San Benito, Alameda, San Mateo, and Monterey County residents are eligible to participate in the Small Animal Master Showmanship contest.
3. Grange and Independent exhibitors are NOT eligible to participate in Small Animal Master Showmanship.
4. Only winners of Advanced Showmanship (in rabbits, cavies, dogs, poultry, and pygmy goats) are eligible to participate in Small Animal Master Showmanship.
 - a. If the first-place winner of Advanced Showmanship in one of the above species has previously won Master Showmanship twice or if for any other reason, the Advanced Showmanship winner does not participate in the Master Showmanship contest, then the second-place individual from that same species would qualify for Master Showmanship.
 - b. If the first-place winner in one of the above species is representing another species of showmanship in the Master Showmanship contest this year, then the next highest place individual from that same species would qualify for Master Showmanship.
 - c. Exhibitors who win in multiple species MUST represent the specie in which they first qualified in, regardless of the association (4-H/FFA) they are representing.
 - d. Participation is limited to top (3) three placers from each category. However, in the interest of competition, if there are not a minimum of three (3) participants in advanced Master Showmanship, then the fourth-place winners in each specie not represented, will be eligible to participate.
5. Exhibitors cannot show their own animals in the Master Showmanship Contest.
6. 4-H and FFA exhibitors DO NOT compete against each other.
7. Results and individual placing will be announced and posted. Awards will be presented shortly after the completion of the Small Animal Master Showmanship Contest at the awards ceremony.
8. The winner of the Master Showmanship contest at the Santa Clara County Fair will be eligible to participate in the California State Fair Master Showmanship contest (Check in the Santa Clara County Fair Office for the California State Fair Junior Best of Show competition entry forms, rules and guidelines).
9. All entry forms and rules will be made available by California State Fair, if you need any assistance with your entries please reach out to the Fair office.

Dog Rules & Guidelines:

1. Obedience class placements by Danish system of judging.
2. Those receiving scores as follows will be awarded the appropriate award indicated:
 - a. 1st group – blue: 190-200 points
 - b. 2nd group – red: 170-189 points
 - c. 3rd group – white: less than 170 points
 - d. Qualifying score: 170 points
3. Exhibitors must receive a qualifying score to be eligible to participate in High in Trial.
4. Highest level of obedience classes to be judged first.
5. A lunch break will be taken at the judge's discretion. Typically, a 30 minute break between obedience and showmanship.
6. This show is open to any 4-H, FFA and Independent from Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, San Benito, Monterey, Alameda, and San Mateo Counties. All dogs must be owned, co-owned or leased and trained by the exhibitors.
7. Judging and scoring will be based on AKC regulations with 4-H modifications (Modification meaning an additional obedience class). The judges' decision is final. THIS IS NOT AN AKC SANCTIONED SHOW.
8. All dogs should be trained by the exhibitor.
9. All dogs must be groomed by the exhibitor. Dogs should not be left unattended on grooming tables at the show. Only minor touch up grooming to be done at the show.
10. All exhibitors must check in at the time indicated on the show schedule page of this book and shall wear their exhibitor arm/band number for the duration of the show. Exhibitors will need to change armband after obedience if showing in both Obedience and Showmanship since separate numbers are used for each show.
11. Dogs shall not be left unattended, let loose or left in cars. Ideally bring a show crate or pen for the dog.
12. Uncontrolled or aggressive dogs will be excused from competition.
13. Any member caught abusing or neglecting their dog(s) will not be allowed to compete and will be brought before management for appropriate action (see code of conduct rules).
14. Bitches in season will be judged in obedience after the regular classes. They may not be shown in showmanship.
15. An exhibitor may exhibit up to two (2) dogs in obedience, but each dog is limited to the class or classes it is eligible to compete in.
16. All members will be required to clean up after their dog(s) and are responsible for watering their dogs.
17. Showmanship animals must be entered and shown in obedience classes.
18. All dogs are to be shown in a collar appropriate for the dog and handler safety and comfort. For showmanship classes a showmanship collar and lead are preferable. However, the judge will determine if a different collar/lead is appropriate for the dog and handler safety and comfort. For Obedience classes, a choke chain, or martingale is preferred.
19. 4-H and FFA classes are separated for showmanship but NOT for obedience. Awards will be provided in showmanship and in each section, no double entering in both sections.
20. The heel pattern is at the judge's discretion but shall include normal, slow, and fast gait, halt with sit and about turn. The judge will walk the heel pattern at the start of the competition. There will be signage of each segment of the heel pattern. The judge will also call movements. Cones will be used for figure 8 exercise.
21. No dogs shall be double entered in an obedience class except dogs used in Primary (Clover) classes.

Dogs

22. All animal youth exhibitors ages 9-19 must take the online YQCA course and upload their certificate of completion when entering online. For more information see the YQCA section in the Rules and Guideline section of this book.
23. All junior small animal exhibitors must also submit a Competitive Exhibit entry. Failure to enter a Junior Competitive Exhibit will result in ineligibility to show animal(s) and receive any premium monies. Competitive Exhibits MAY NOT be purchased – they must follow Competitive Exhibits guidelines. See the Competitive Exhibits book for more details.
24. **4-H Primary (Clover)** is an exhibitor who is 5 years on January 1st of current year to 8 years of age on December 31st of previous year.
25. By entering an animal at the Santa Clara County Fair, exhibitors are obliged to assist Santa Clara County Fair staff if management asks to use your animal for Small Animal Master Showmanship.
26. All Fair Livestock shows are run by volunteers – without them we wouldn't be able to hold these shows. We rely on the participation of Friends and Family members of Exhibitors to be able to offer our wonderful Livestock program to our Youth, so please be SURE to contact the Santa Clara County Fair Livestock Assistant, Maddie Beckwith at mbeckwith@thefair.org to schedule some time when you or a family member will be able to volunteer during the Fair Shows. Even if you aren't available during your Youth members' show, we can sure use the help during other events, so just let us know what your availability may be. Thank you in advance for your help!!

Market Poultry Rules and Guidelines:

1. American system of judging.
2. Only exhibitors ages 9 and above as of January 1st of the current year, may enter market classes, including market poultry.
3. Chicken pens are two (2) birds of the same age, breed, and sex, cooped together.
4. There is a limit of three (3) market poultry entries per exhibitor.
5. Chickens must be 6 to 8 weeks or 42 to 56 days old and must weigh between 5 to 8 lbs. per chicken. 
6. Meat pen birds may not be entered in any non-market class, except showmanship.
7. Turkeys are recommended to be approximately 17 weeks or 120 days old and must weigh a minimum of 15 ½ lbs. and a maximum of 39 ½ lbs.
8. There is a limit of one (1) market turkey per exhibitor.
9. Champion and Reserve Champion meat pens and turkeys will be chosen for both 4-H and FFA and must be sold at the Junior Livestock Auction. All other market meat pens and turkeys judged as market ready may be sold at the auction if the exhibitor so chooses. An exhibitor can sell only one (1) poultry meat pen, turkey, or other market animal. Refer to Junior Livestock Auction Rules.

10. All birds must remain on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds after judging. This rule is subject to the availability of suitable cages. Final decision regarding the appropriate size of cage and availability is determined by the Poultry Chair or Fair Management.

Pygmy Goats Rules and Guidelines:

1. American system of judging.
2. Please read all State Rules for California Fairs, and Local Livestock and Auction rules in this book.
3. This is not a NPGA sanctioned show.
4. Exhibitors are responsible for their own animals' food and water for the whole duration of being on Santa Clara County Fairgrounds.
5. Pygmy goat owners must provide proof of ownership at entry due dates.
6. Pygmy goats must be owned for 30 days prior to the start of the Santa Clara County Fair. Any goats including offspring must be entered in the show to be on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds.
7. All animals must remain at the Santa Clara County Fair from the time of the show through the end of fair.
8. All animals must have tattoo identification or be microchipped. If an animal is microchipped, the exhibitor is required to provide a reader at both the vet check and the ringside. Failure to do so may disqualify the animal.
9. Entries open to all youth exhibitors of Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, San Benito, Alameda, San Mateo, and Monterey Counties.
10. No bucks allowed over 7 weeks of age. Bucklings under 7 weeks can't be shown.
11. Horns may not exceed two (2) inches and must be blunted. No blunting allowed on the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds.
12. No collars, halters, costumes, décor or props may be left on goats while in their pens.
13. All pygmy goats will be bedded on shavings and are to remain as such through release time of the Santa Clara County Fair. All pens must be stripped prior to load-out.
14. All exhibitors (4-H, FFA, Independent, and Grange) will show together in the same classes except in showmanship.
15. By entering an animal at the Santa Clara County Fair, exhibitors are obliged to assist Santa Clara County Fair staff if management asks to use your animal for Small Animal Master Showmanship.
16. All animal youth exhibitors ages 9-19 must take the online YQCA course and upload their certificate of completion when entering online. For more information see the YQCA section in the Rules and Guideline section of the book.
17. All junior small animal exhibitors must also submit a Competitive Exhibit entry. Failure to enter a Junior Competitive Exhibit will result in ineligibility to show animal(s) and receive any premium monies. Competitive Exhibits MAY NOT be purchased – they must follow Competitive Exhibits guidelines. See the Competitive Exhibits book for more details.

Junior Livestock Showmanship Rules & Guidelines:

1. American system of judging.
2. At this time we do not offer showmanship classes for Independent or Grange exhibitors. We do however offer them to out of county 4-H and FFA exhibitors in Santa Cruz, San Benito, Alameda, San Mateo, and Monterey Counties.
3. All showmanship classes must be pre-registered on the official SCCF online entry form. NO ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER ENTRIES HAVE CLOSED.
4. Only animals owned, fitted, and shown by the exhibitor in the Junior Livestock Department market, feeder, and/or breeding livestock classes, or performance classes are allowed to be shown in showmanship.
5. Any animal that is disqualified due to weight (Over Jumbo Weight), at time of weigh-in, and is their only animal is eligible to be shown in showmanship. If another animal has already weighed in and made weight, then the additional animal must leave the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds immediately.
6. Showmanship contests are open to exhibitors entered in FFA and 4-H Livestock Divisions as mentioned above.
7. All contestants are required to wear the official 4-H or FFA uniform as stated in the front of this book.
8. Please NOTE that for ALL classes, once you enter the arena for the next level of Showmanship, in a particular species, you now compete at that level until you advance again. You MAY NOT go back down a level (in that specie) at ANY future Santa Clara County Fair. **NEW!**
9. 4-H AGE REQUIRED FOR SHOWMANSHIP CLASSES ARE THE EXHIBITOR'S AGE AS OF JANUARY 1ST OF THE CURRENT YEAR.
10. Showmanship first place winners are not required to show in the next level of showmanship the year they win, but they will be required to move up to the next level in the following years.
11. Showmanship classes will be broken into groups as follows:
 - a. **4-H Beginning Showmanship** – Exhibitors who are ages 9 to 13 years of age, as of January 1st, of the current year, who have never won a first-place ribbon in Showmanship in that species at the Santa Clara County Fair. First, second, and third place ribbon winners may enter Novice Showmanship this year. The first-place winner must move up to Novice next year.
 - b. **4-H Novice Showmanship** – Exhibitors who are 14 years of age and older, as of January 1, of the current year, and exhibitors 13 years of age and younger who have won a first-place ribbon in Beginning Showmanship or have previously advanced to Novice Showmanship at the Santa Clara County Fair. First, second, and third place ribbon winners may enter Advanced Showmanship this year. The first-place winner must move up to Advanced next year. The first-place winners of the Novice Showmanship classes are eligible to compete in the Novice Large Animal Master Showmanship Contest.
 - c. **4-H Advanced Showmanship** – Exhibitors of any age who have won a first-place ribbon in Novice showmanship of this species in prior years at the Santa Clara County Fair. Additionally, any exhibitor who has exhibited in prior years at the Santa Clara County Fair at the Advanced level must show in the Advanced Showmanship group. The first-place winners of the Advanced Showmanship classes are eligible to compete in the Advanced Large Animal Master Showmanship Contest.
 - d. **FFA Novice Showmanship** - Exhibitors who are showing this species for the first year ever, who have NEVER shown this species previously in this or any other organization, show, or fair, excluding jackpot shows. The project should start no sooner than September 1st of the preceding year. The place winners of first, second, and third, may enter Advanced Showmanship this year. The first-place winners of the FFA Novice Showmanship classes are eligible to compete in the Novice Large Animal Master Showmanship Contest.
 - e. **FFA Advanced Showmanship:** Exhibitors who have shown this specie in this organization or any other organization at Santa Clara County Fair, excluding jackpot shows, must show in advanced FFA Showmanship. The project should start no sooner than September 1st of the preceding year. The first-place winners of the FFA Advanced Showmanship classes are eligible to compete in the Advanced Large Animal Master Showmanship Contest.

Junior Livestock Showmanship Rules

12. Any exhibitor found to have entered the wrong showmanship class will be stripped of all awards. **NEW!**

FFA and 4-H Supreme Showmanship

Sheep, Swine, Beef, Market Goat, Dairy Goat, and Dairy Cattle. Top three (3) 4-H Advanced Showmen and top three (3) FFA Advanced Showmen winners will compete against each other for this honor immediately following the FFA Show for each species. There must be at least one (1) FFA and one (1) 4-H advance winners to compete for the title in each species.

Large Animal Master Showmanship Rules & Guidelines:

1. Open to Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, San Benito, Alameda, San Mateo, and Monterey County 4-H/FFA members.
2. Grange and Independent exhibitors are not eligible to participate in Large Animal Master Showmanship, as we do not offer Independent or Grange showmanship at this time.
3. Only winners of Novice and Advanced Showmanship (Beef, Dairy Cattle, Dairy Goats, Sheep, Swine, Horse, or Market Goats) are eligible to participate in Large Animal Master Showmanship.
 - a. Winners of Large Animal Showmanship MUST declare whether or not they will be participating in the Large Animal Master Showmanship contest within one (1) hour of the conclusion of the respective species show to the Santa Clara County Fair Livestock Office. Failure to notify Livestock Office of participation or failure to check in at ringside for the Master Showmanship Contest may result in the exhibitor being placed on probation for one year or longer if Fair management deems appropriate.
 - b. If the first-place winner of Novice or Advanced Showmanship in one (1) of the above species chooses not to participate or is representing another specie in the Master Showmanship contest, then the second-place individual from that same specie would qualify for Master Showmanship.
 - c. Should the second place Exhibitor in one (1) of the above species become eligible for the Large Animal Master Showmanship Contest they must declare to the Santa Clara County Fair Livestock Office they will be participating in the Large Animal Master Showmanship by 8PM on the day they were notified. Failure to notify Livestock Office of participation or failure to check in at ringside for the Master Showmanship Contest may result in the exhibitor being placed on probation for one year or longer if Fair management deems appropriate.
 - d. Participation is limited to the top two (2) placers from each category. Should neither the first nor second place winner choose not to participate in the Large Animal Master Showmanship contest then no one will represent that species. However, in the interest of a competition, if there are not a minimum of three (3) participants in either Novice or Advanced Master Showmanship, then the third-place winners in each specie not represented, will be eligible to participate.
 - e. Novice showmanship winners in any specie who also win Advanced Showmanship in another specie MUST show in Advanced Master Showmanship irrespective of which class they won first.
 - f. If a Novice exhibitor qualifies for Advanced Master Showmanship as a 2nd place winner, they may choose to represent Novice or Advanced Master Showmanship.
 - g. Exhibitors who win in multiple species at the same skill level (i.e. – all in Novice) MUST represent the species in which they won first, regardless of the association (4-H/FFA) they represent.
4. Results and individual placing will be announced, posted and awards will be presented shortly after completion of the Large Animal Master Showmanship Content at the awards ceremony.
5. Exhibitors cannot show their own animals in the Master Showmanship contest.
6. 4-H and FFA exhibitors DO NOT compete against each other.
7. The winner of the Santa Clara County Fair Master Showmanship contest will be eligible to participate in the California State Fair Junior Best of Show Showmanship contest. (Check in the Santa Clara County Fair Office for the California State Fair Junior Best of Show competition entry forms, rules and guidelines.)
8. There are no restrictions on the number of times an exhibitor can participate in and/or win Large Animal Master Showmanship at the Santa Clara County Fair.

PLEASE NOTE - ALL HORSES must be owned or Leased by Exhibitors no later than April 2, 2025. Lease Agreements for all leased horses MUST be signed and Notarized NO LATER than April 2, 2025. Ownership Statements for Grade Horses must ALSO be Notarized no later April 2, 2025. Hard Copy or Electronic copy of Fully Notarized documents with pictures, Registration Papers or Dated Bill of Sale MUST be filed with Santa Clara County Fair or Horse Show Management by 11:59pm on April 2, 2025. For further information or forms or to e-mail Lease/Ownership/Registration documents to Regina Matthews at 408-722-8315.

All Exhibitors must have ORIGINAL notarized Lease Agreement, notarized Ownership Form, dated Bill of Sale or Registration papers showing entrant's or family member's name as delineated in Rule #3 of the Horse Show Rules, available for review the morning of the show in case of any questions at check-in. Failure to provide original paperwork if requested will render the Entry incomplete, thereby disqualifying entry from competition in the Show.

Horse Rules & Guidelines:

1. All State Rules for California Fairs, Santa Clara County Fair rules apply. The horse show will be run under United States Equestrian Federation (USEF) Rules except for Gymkhana, where California Gymkhana Association (CGA) rules will apply.
2. The California Dept. of Food & Agriculture (CDFA) requires one \$14.00 fee for each horse entered.
3. Ownership or Lease: Any horse exhibited in the junior or youth division must be owned or leased by the junior exhibitor showing the horse or owned by the junior exhibitor's parent, stepparent, sibling, half-sibling, stepsibling, grandparent, step grandparent, sibling's spouse, half sibling's spouse, step-sibling's spouse or legal guardian (as evidenced by court documents), or owned by the institution in which the junior exhibitor is enrolled as a ward. Separate legal entities, such as family corporations, trusts, or partnerships, are also authorized owners of the youth exhibitor's horse so long as all legal and equitable owners and beneficiaries of the legal entity are individuals specifically authorized by this rule. "Owned" means, in addition to other legitimate methods of acquiring ownership, the bona fide legal ownership obtained for adequate consideration in reasonable relationship with the actual market value of the horse.
4. The Santa Clara County Fair REQUIRES the completion of the Youth for Quality Care of Animals Ethics course for all Large and Small Animal exhibitors age 9 to 19. The course may be completed online, takes approximately one hour and may be done at any time before the entry deadline date of **June 26, 2025**. Once the course is passed, a Certificate of Completion with a Certificate number is provided. This Certificate number must be submitted to complete all entries.
5. Juniors may only handle stallion foals born in the current year.
6. National Horse Breed Association Registered Purebred animals cannot be entered as a grade or unregistered animal.

7. Registered animals must have original registration papers only (no photocopies) naming the exhibitor or family member as delineated in Rule #3 above, as the owner. Grade horses owned by an exhibitor require a dated bill of sale or a notarized Statement of Ownership naming the exhibitor or family member as delineated in Rule #3 above, as the owner. Documents should be notarized no later than 4/2/25. Original ownership papers (no photocopies) for half-breed, appendix, pink-papered & breeding stock I.D must name the exhibitor, or a family member as delineated in Rule #3 above, as owner to be accepted into Division 3101.
8. Leased horse agreements MUST be notarized. Documents should be notarized no later than 4/2/25.
9. **COPIES OF ALL DATED BILLS OF SALE, REGISTRATION, OWNERSHIP, OR LEASE DOCUMENTS MUST SUBMITTED TO HORSE SHOW MANAGEMENT/FAIR MANAGEMENT BY 11:59pm ON April 2, 2025 via E-mail. ORIGINAL DOCUMENTS MUST BE AVAILABLE FOR INSPECTION THE MORNING OF SHOW IF REQUESTED.** 
10. Random testing of horses is possible. If a drug has been given to your horse for any reason, within 72 hours of the show, a drug declaration must be filed with the horse show supervisor.
11. Horses and ponies entered in the show must be ridden by owners or leasers only.
12. Horses may be checked for soundness upon arrival. The Santa Clara County Fair staff and Team Leads may make a determination as to soundness and can dismiss from the grounds any horse deemed unable to perform, or where it is in the best interest of the horse.
13. All horse exhibitors are responsible for their own veterinarian expenses.
14. Exhibitors are required to care for, prepare, and show their animals.
15. A horse or pony may be shown by one (1) exhibitor only, in any one (1) division.
16. Adult help (including leaders, parents and trainers) in grooming, exercising and preparing for show, or coaching from the rail during competition may cause the exhibitor and/or horse/pony to be disqualified. Disqualification may consist of withholding ribbons/awards, removal from the horse show grounds, elimination from further competitions at the Santa Clara County Fair.
17. Violation of 4-H, FFA, Santa Clara County Fair or State Rules for California Fairs including Code of Conduct, will be grounds for immediate disqualification from this show and may result in loss of all awards or participation in future Fair Horse Shows, at management's discretion.
18. All junior exhibitors must have "on ground" supervision by a responsible adult.
19. TWO-MINUTE GATE WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED. A four-minute tack change will be allowed upon request only if made prior to the class before the needed tack change.
20. Tie-downs, running martingales, mechanical hackamores, etc. are prohibited, with the exception of Gymkhana classes. Bareback pads are prohibited. Horse boots and wraps are prohibited in competition with exception of Gymkhana classes. Boots or wraps may be used in competition only if a veterinarian's note has been given to the horse show competition, specifying the need for equipment, prior to the competition. Boots and wraps may be used in the warmup areas.
21. LUNCH BREAKS – No set time.
22. An ASTM Safety approved hard hat with harness strap in place must be worn whenever mounted anywhere on at the show facility grounds.
23. State Fair qualification – FFA, 4-H, and Independent exhibitors will be entered into the same classes but will only compete against those in their respective organizations. The highest placing individual from each organization in each class will qualify for the California State Fair Horse Show. See California State Fair for more information on this rule.
24. Exhibitors entered into a Walk/Trot class cannot cross over to a canter class. Walk/Trot classes limited to beginner riders, must be in their 1st or 2nd year of showing. Horse/Rider combination limited to two (2) years only. 
25. By entering an animal at the Santa Clara County Fair, exhibitors are obliged to assist Santa Clara County Fair staff if management asks to use your animal for Large Animal Master Showmanship. Should your animal be used, it should be at ring side when requested, with all needed equipment necessary to show said animal. Please be sure to label your equipment so that it can be returned.
26. All junior large animal exhibitors must also submit a Competitive Exhibit entry. Failure to enter a Junior Competitive Exhibit will result in ineligibility to show animal(s) and receive any premium monies. Competitive Exhibits MAY NOT be purchased – they must follow Competitive Exhibits guidelines. See the Competitive Exhibits book for more details.

1. Danish system of judging for market readiness. For judging scorecard see the State Rules for California Fairs.

2. American system of judging for market order.

3. Any animal that cannot be safely controlled by the exhibitor or presents danger to any person whatsoever may be removed from the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds and disqualified from the show. This determination is to be made at the sole discretion of Santa Clara County Fair Management. This applies to Santa Clara County Fair shows and any other fair activities. There will be no appeal for this decision.
4. Upon arrival at the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds, all goats must have a permanent Scrapie tag in their ear which EXACTLY matches the bill of sale (flock # and individual #). If any animal loses their scrapie tag, the Santa Clara County Fair office must be notified immediately, and you will be given instructions for a missing scrapie tag or fair tag.
5. All Local, State Rules for California Fairs, and health rules apply and must be adhered to at all times.
6. After weigh-in, market goats will be divided into weight classes within the market weight range for convenience of judging and lot uniformity.
7. Market goats weighing in the jumbo weight range may show in the jumbo market class but will NOT be eligible to show in Champion Drive nor receive any Champion awards.
8. Jumbo class goats will be eligible to sell at auction but will be paid for a maximum of top market weight.
9. Market goats exceeding the top jumbo weight will NOT be penned and must leave the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds immediately. They are ineligible to participate in any classes at the Santa Clara County Fair unless, it is the exhibitors' only animal. If it is the only animal, the exhibitor may only participate in showmanship and is not eligible for market classes or auction.
10. All market goats will be bedded on shavings and are to remain as such through the run of the Santa Clara County Fair. All pens must be stripped prior to load-out.
11. All market goat and feeder goats must be "slick shorn" (3/8" or less hair) above the knee or hock joint upon arrival at the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds for vet check. Animals not meeting this rule will be disqualified and sent home.
12. Market goats entered in market classes may NOT be entered in breeding classes and vice versa.
13. No collars, halters, costumes, décor or props may be left on goats while in their pens.
14. Animals should display meat goat conformation. Dairy goat breeds or dairy crosses may not be entered.

5. After weigh-in, market beef will be divided into weight classes within the market weight range for convenience of judging and uniformity.
6. Market beef weighing in the jumbo weight range may show in the jumbo market class but will NOT be eligible to show in Champion Drive nor receive any Champion awards.
7. Jumbo class market beef will be eligible to sell at auction but will be paid for a maximum of top market weight.
8. Market beef exceeding the top jumbo weight will NOT be penned and must leave the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds immediately. They are ineligible to participate in any classes at the Santa Clara County Fair, unless it is the exhibitors' only animal. If it is the only animal, the exhibitor may only participate in showmanship and is not eligible for market classes or auction.
9. All beef must be bedded on pelleted shavings and are to remain as such through the run of the Santa Clara County Fair. Rubber mats will be required under all cattle bedding. All pens must be stripped prior to load-out.
10. Beef entered in market classes may NOT be entered in breeding classes and vice versa.
11. Original brand inspection slips must be surrendered at the time of weigh-in.
12. Only animals judged market ready will be eligible for sale through auction.
13. All ear tags must be clean and legible before animal crosses the scale.
14. Ear tags and hardware from previous shows must be removed prior to weigh-in.

- Prize buckets will be given to the 1st place team.
- When: July 27th @ 3PM
- Where: The Cattle Blocking Chute area

Rules

1. Fitting teams consist of 3 exhibitors, regardless of their club/chapter. A sign-up sheet will be available at the Livestock Office.
2. Participants must provide all of their own fitting supplies, cleaning equipment (such as shovels, rakes, and brooms) and cattle. Participants will not be allowed to leave the fitting area to retrieve more fitting supplies once the competition has started.
3. Fitting teams will not be required to wash their animals as part of the contest, however it is required that cattle being used for the contest are clean and dry before the start of the contest.
4. Teams may not use inappropriate fitting practices or materials. The use of any dyes, colored products on an animal's legs or body, hair builders, or banned fitting products on any part of the animal is prohibited.

8. This is an ADGA sanctioned show and ADGA rules govern.

Failure to enter a Junior Competitive Exhibit will result in ineligibility to show animal(s) and receive any premium monies. Competitive Exhibits MAY NOT be purchased – they must follow Competitive Exhibits guidelines. See the Competitive Exhibits book for more details.

- When entering classes 10-13, you should be entering the Dam's information in the online entry system. When entering classes 16-17, you should be entering the Sire's information in the online entry system. This includes name, registration number, DOB, etc. for the sire.
 - 10. Junior Produce of Dam:** Two (2) does, produce of same doe, include dam registration number, one entry allowed per dam. Animals can be owned by multiple exhibitors.
 - 11. Senior Produce of Dam:** Two (2) does, produce of same doe, at least one doe "in milk", include dam registration number, one entry allowed per dam. Animals can be owned by multiple exhibitors.
 - 12. Dam and Daughter:** Dam and daughter pair, include dam's registration number, one entry allowed per dam. Animals can be owned by multiple exhibitors.
 - 13. Junior Breeding Trio:** Three (3) does not in milk under the age of 2, all owned by the same exhibitor, one entry per exhibitor.
 - 14. Senior Dairy Herd:** Three (3) does in milk all owned by the same exhibitor, one entry per exhibitor.
 - 15. Junior Get of Sire:** Three (3) does not in milk under the age of 2 sired by the same buck, include buck's registration number, one entry allowed per sire. Animals can be owned by multiple exhibitors.
 - 16. Get of Sire:** Three (3) does "in milk" sired by the same buck, include registration number, one entry allowed per sire. Animals can be owned by multiple exhibitors.

NEW!

- All dairy goat exhibitors will be automatically entered for consideration for the Premier Breeder (Top placing animals and sold offspring placings considered) and the Premier Exhibitor (Animals owned and showmanship placing considered) awards.

Dairy Goat Star Milking Contest

- Prizes for 1st place standard breed and 1st place dwarf breed.
- Rosettes will be awarded 1st – 8th
- Exhibitor must own animal being entered.
- This is not an official milk test; this is a competition to simulate a milk test and encourage youth to put their herds on official milk tests.
- This competition will be measuring the weight of the milk produced by a single doe in a 24-hour period, not the volume produced. In this contest, the protein nor butterfat content will not be measured. Milk will be weighed in pounds and calculated to the nearest tenth of a pound.
- Milk produced during this 24-hour period will be weighed by the Test Conductor on an official scale. After milking, exhibitors will submit the milk to the Test Conductor who will weigh it in an official milk pail.
- The weight of milk from both the morning and evening milkings will be totaled and used to determine the winner.
- Machine and hand milking is accepted.
- Standard breeds and dwarf breeds will compete separately.
- Sign-ups will be available on the online entry system. Pre-Entry is required to compete.
- When checking in the doe's registration papers, please be sure to specify the doe's number of lactations, and date of freshening.
- Results will be announced during the Awards Ceremony after the Master Showmanship contest.
- Milk test schedule
 - Thursday July 31st (Preliminary milk out) – 8:00pm
 - Friday August 1st (1st Milking and weighing) – 8:00am
 - Friday August 1st (2nd Milking and weighing) – 8:00pm

- Milk Test Procedure
 - All exhibitors will meet at the arena prior to the start of the first milking session to understand the test procedure.

Dairy Goats

- BEFORE the start of the milking session the Test Conductor MUST be present to check in does. Failure to check-in will result in disqualification.
- Milking MUST BE PERFORMED by the owner/exhibitor or in the case of multiple does entered by one exhibitor, another chosen exhibitor may perform the milking. Parents, Project Leaders/Advisors or anyone other than an exhibitor ARE NOT ALLOWED to milk the goats.
- Exhibitors of entered does must be present and on time for each milking session or the does will be disqualified.
- The milk Test Conductor will be in the dairy goat area at 8:00(AM/PM) for each scheduled milking session. The Test Conductor will notify you when you are allowed to start milking.
- It is expected that your goat will be milked out within a 30-45-minute time frame. Exhibitors with multiple does entered in this contest MUST speak with the Test Conductor prior to the first milk out session to discuss the allowed milking window. This will determine whether exhibitors with multiple does entered will need help from other exhibitors to complete milking within the time frame.
- Exhibitors must notify the Test Conductor after each doe has been milked out. The Test Conductor will then weigh the milk and record the weight for each doe.
- In the case of a tie, The doe with a longer lactation will place over the doe with a shorter lactation.
- Before or between milking each doe, thoroughly clean your milking pail. After your milk has been weighed you need to dump your milk in the designated milk dump container, not anywhere else on the Fairgrounds. Milk dump location will be specified at the beginning of fair.

Dairy Goat Fitting Contest – Youth Only

This contest is designed to give youth exhibitors a way to showcase their skills in fitting dairy goats. Exhibitors are given 1 hour to fully prepare their dairy goat for a show. Fitting teams will be judged on teamwork, safety, cleanliness, efficiency, and knowledge while fitting their animal. **Fitting teams must adhere to the fitting guidelines stated in the 2025 Santa Clara County Fair Jr. Livestock Book.**

- Ribbons will be given to 1st – 3rd place fitting teams
- Prize buckets will be given to the 1st place team
- When: July 27th @ 5PM
- Where: The Main Arena

Rules

1. Fitting teams will consist of 3 youth exhibitors, without the restriction of being from the same club/chapter. A sign-up sheet will be available at the Livestock Office.
2. Participants must provide their own fitting supplies and cleaning equipment (such as shovels, brooms, and rakes). Tarps are required. One dairy goat will be provided to each team. Each team will be fitting the same breed of goat. Teams may not use inappropriate fitting practices or materials. The use of razors on mammary systems is prohibited.
3. Teams are not allowed to wash their goats as part of this contest. All portions of this contest will take part in the Main Arena in Expo Hall. Dairy goats are required to stay on the tarps until the fitting portion of the contest is over.
4. Generators are not permitted. Power will be provided, however it is recommended that fitting teams bring their own extension cords.
5. Fitting teams will NOT use a stanchion or milking stand during the contest.
6. After the fitting portion of the contest has ended, one member of each team will show their dairy goat in the ring and answer the judge's questions about the fitting process.

- All competitors for the dairy goat youth award will participate in an interview that will cover a mix of practical skills and important dairy goat knowledge including general goat knowledge, financial knowledge of your own herd, dairy goat experience, and ADGA knowledge.
- A 300–600-word response must be entered by the end of check-in day responding to the following question provided by Dairy Goat chair.

Considerations will be given on the below point scale.

100 Point total as follows:

- These categories to be scored after talking to ALL contestants.

WINNERS IN THE ABOVE AREAS WILL BE DETERMINED IN THREE CATEGORIES OF SCOPE.

25 points	Possible for PUBLIC IMAGE as shown by proper preparation or grooming of animals, cleanliness of exhibitor; and proper condition and health of animals.	15 points	Possible for DISPLAY, posters, pictures, charts, articles, clipping or by any method of educating the public in a pleasing manner.
25 points	Possible for CLEANINESS as indicated by the Clean Stall (competition) score card. Includes cleanliness of animal and exhibitor.	10 points	Possible for ENTHUSIASM or ATTITUDE, which will include enjoyment of the project and love of Dairy Goats.
15 points	Possible for KNOWLEDGE, as conveyed to the public. Winners will answer questions politely, present a positive view of dairy goats, and inform the public factually with information on breed characteristics, milk production and husbandry.	5 points	Possible for SHOWMANSHIP, based on placing of that individual in whichever level he or she enters; 5 points for first place 4 for second and so on.
		5 points	Possible for CLASS PLACING; 5 points for first place, 4 for second and so on. The average of the exhibitor's animals' placing will be used to achieve the owners score. (group placing, championships, etc., not counted).

- Exhibitors owning fewer than five animals
- Those with five to ten animals
- Those with more than ten animals

This is done so that the handicap of caring for different size herds can be overcome.

From the three semi-finalists, juniors who wish to be considered for the award must be available after the Junior Show for an interview. The interview will cover; individual goals, size, and scope of project; knowledge of cost and income for the project; prior awards or recognition; participation in the decision of the project (the why, how, and when); history of his or her project; any failures or mistakes.

The Hans and Lonnie Toensfeldt Junior Livestock Auction takes place once a year at the Santa Clara County Fair. The following are sold eggs, rabbit meat pens, meat pen chickens, turkeys, pigs, lambs, goats and cattle. Large animals (pigs, lambs, goats, and cattle) are sold on a per pound basis during a live auction. Eggs will be sold by the dozen, rabbit meat pens (3 rabbits) and chicken meat pens (2 chickens) will be sold by the lot (flat amount) **NOT** by the number of animals in the pen or by weight. Each will be sold to the highest bidder. Auctioneer has final say. All sales are final, and buyers are responsible for all costs including process and packaging.

How to Become a Buyer?

New buyers can pre-register online at THEFAIR.ORG. The assigned buyer number will be ready for pick up the day of the auction. Buyers may also register in person the day of the auction.
